"She Knows All the Answers"

The Lily of the Mohawks

It is interesting to learn that an Indian tribe in the United States and Canada have entered petitions for the bottification of Kateri Takawitika, Lily of the Mohawks. The signers are chiefdoms, government officials, and tribal councilors, tribal members, children in schools and the signatories would glorify the hearts of some of our noted savants. There are 275 signatures from the United States, 2005 from Canada, but we are told that they are more plainly written than two-thirds of the signatures in letters received from other sources. The writing in every case is plain, and in the most part, most particularly the sign language and Indian characters. A few of the petitions are encircled with Indian signatures and in some instances they are signed by fingerprints.

Where It Is Really Hot

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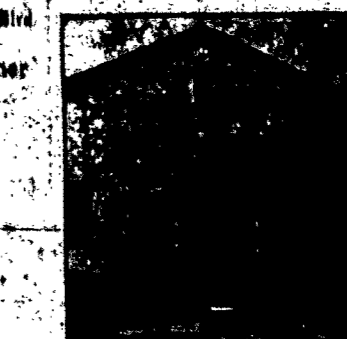
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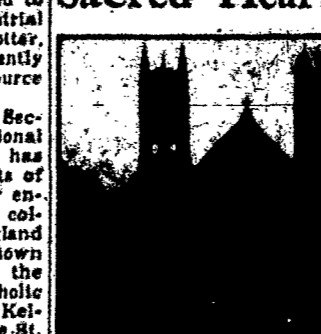

PASTORAL CITES NEED OF PRIESTS IN SALVADOR

SAN SALVADOR—In a pastoral convoking the Second Archdiocesan Catechetical Congress here, July 21 to 23, the Most Rev. Luis Chavez y Gonzalez, Archbishop of San Salvador, stresses two important needs for such a congress: the great scarcity of priests, and pervasive propaganda. In El Salvador there is only one priest for every 12,000 souls and this situation is aggravated by the fact that some are scattered over wide areas. There is an urgent and imperative need, the Archbishop says, for a well-trained laity to carry on catechetical work, thus making up for the lack of priests. Aside from the fact that many children are not receiving religious instruction, the Archbishop says, that some are subjected to various kinds of perverted propaganda destructive to good morals and conducive to apostasy.
