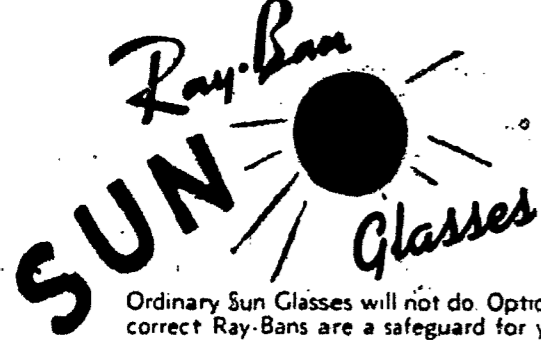

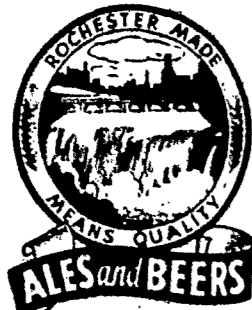

POPE AND THE PRESS SUMMER SCHOOL TALK

Dailies Hail Pope's Speech

See Views Filling World Need Now

NEW YORK — "The Pope's discourse on the influence of Divine Providence upon human affairs is keyed in a high note of spiritual exaltation," comments the New York Times in an editorial on the Holy Father's message broadcast Sunday, June 29.

"It is a hard question His Holiness has set himself to answer," says the editorial. "The answer is demanded in the cries arising from millions of suffering people who ask why it is that God permits the horrors of this war."

"The Holy Father answers it on the Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul, anniversary of the frightful scenes amid which the Church was founded in Rome. Then, as he reminds the world, human bodies glow as torches in the gardens of Pileatus and the torn corpses of Christian martyrs littered the arenas and streets. But he points to the nineteen centuries of strife between right and wrong since, through which right has in the end prevailed."

CINCINNATI — An editorial in the Cincinnati Enquirer asserts the Holy Father's radio message of June 29 "revealed the head of the Church as a man given to thinking in the broadest spiritual and humanitarian terms, not of national destinies but of human welfare."

The paper criticizes those who predicted that "the Pope of Peace would bestow the power and blessing of the Church as an accolade upon the Nazi panzer-divisions as they sped on their newest conquest... albeit one involving a nation where the Church has been the victim of persecution on a scale greater even than in Nazi Germany itself."

"Those, both in the Catholic Church and out, who have admired Pope Pius XII for what he is and for what he has stood for, could not help but feel pleased and gratified that he chose to ignore the newest phase of the war, and to refrain from the mistake of lending the offices of the Church to the greatest campaign of aggression in the history of the world."

"The message, however, was not distinguished alone by what it refrained from saying. In its positive content, the speech was a stirring and comforting message to troubled humanity."

ST. PAUL — The Holy Father's June 29 broadcast was a "message of faith in God and in His purposes uttered to a world that never needed such a message as badly as today," says the St. Paul Pioneer Press in an editorial. "The Pope's message was a reminder to mankind, at a time when faith may be shaken in Divine justice, that God is not on the side of the aggressor, but men as often before on the side of the aggressor."

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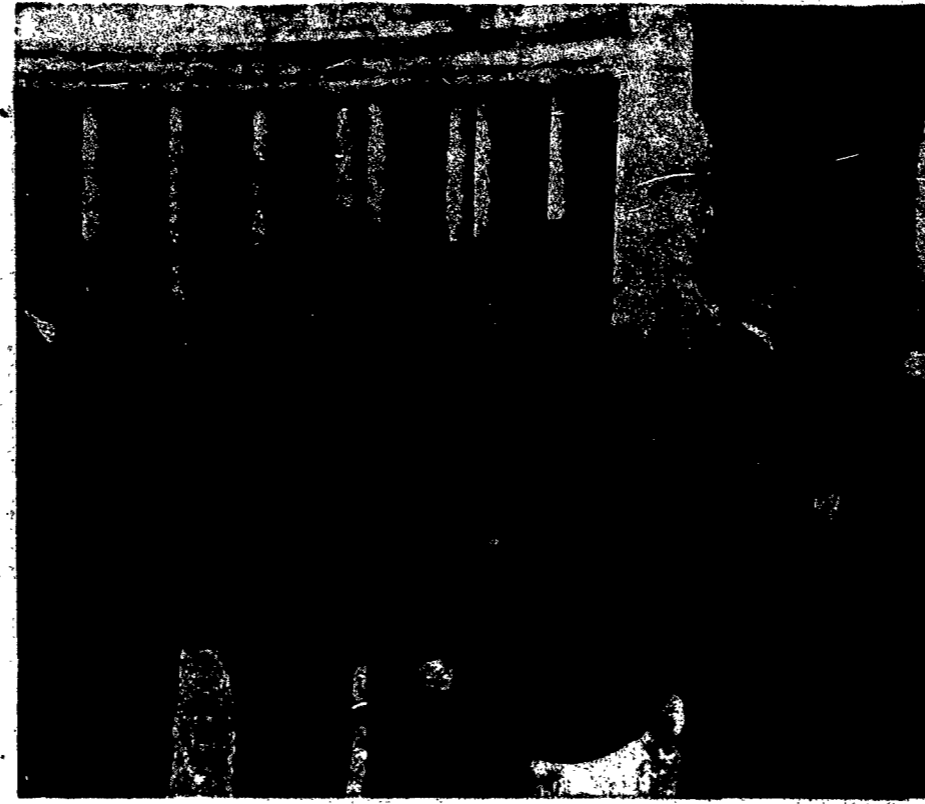
conspicuous of the Pope's attitude towards the issue of this war and its antecedents, Bishop Hurley said. "I shall leave it to your hearers, to judge if it gives any comfort to those who have looked the flood of destruction and hatred upon the world, if it can by any stretch of imagination, be considered as lending approval to those publicists who would deter us from defending our Christian civilization against the might of embattled paganism."

Throughout the address ran the theme of confidence in the President and the Congress, and of discipline and obedience to authority as the only means of achieving national unity in the midst of a grave national crisis. The Bishop insisted that he was expressing his own views. "Due to my past connections with the Papal Secretariate of State," he said, "I deem it well to say at the outset that this address is delivered without any mandate from the Holy See; that I use only documents of public record, and that I express only my own authority."

"The American people will be wise," Bishop Hurley said, "if they turn themselves as individuals to the task of moral rearmament. The years which lie ahead will probe us with unrelenting fingers to find and to exploit our moral weakness. A democracy above all forms of government, must find its strength in the virtue of the people. Its greatest danger is decadence from within. It is my most earnest prayer that we may set ourselves with a will to the task of sanctifying ourselves, our homes and our public life, to the end that in these days of trial and reckoning we may be and remain a Christian example among the nations, a people acceptable to Almighty God."

Views World Crisis In Cliff Haven Talk

CLIFF HAVEN — Speaking at the Catholic Summer School during the week to several hundred Knights of Columbus, on the "Present International Crisis," the Hon. Michael J. Walsh, Secretary of the State of New York explained that "though we seem to be faced with the dilemma of choosing between Nazism and Communism it is my belief, there is no necessity to make such a choice."

"Regardless of our own history or the relationship of our ancestors with England, we hope and pray that England will survive. With all her faults she is Christian and democratic and our own church has grown and prospered within her boundaries and territories. Russia exemplifies Communism. We should not do anything in the present world crisis that will enable Communist Russia or Nazi Germany to be stronger at the end of the war than it is today."

"As Catholics, we must heed the warning of His Holiness, the best informed man in the world, when he assures us that the real world danger is 'black paganism' and councils us that it can be met only by sacrifice. Nazism, Fascism, Communism are all symptoms of paganism. But there are also many symptoms of it in this country. The disciples of Communism and the many materialists who will not admit they are Communists will determine our American system if they are not thwarted."

Catholic Book Week To Open November 2

BOSTON — The second National Catholic Book Week, sponsored by the Catholic Liberty Association will be held this year November 2 to 8 at the same time as the secular book week, according to plans announced by Charles L. Higgins of the Boston Public Library. The National Catholic plans to issue a colored poster for Catholic Book Week, which will be available in the early fall. Local observance will be directed by committees formed in the various dioceses of the country. A supplement to the "Reading List for Catholics" issued last year by the America Press, will be ready well in advance of Book Week.

Wisconsin Steps Up Drive On Bad Books

RACINE, Wis.—Under a law which has received the signature of Governor Julius P. Heil, sale or possession of obscene literature becomes a felony instead of a misdemeanor in the State of Wisconsin. The previous statute was called too mild by local authorities since it provided annual fines or short jail sentences only for sale of such literature. Fines for either sale or possession now range from \$100 to \$5,000 and imprisonment will be from three months to five years.

It has been announced by the Rev. Paul J. Giegrich, chaplain at the field. The cards bear a cross and the flag of the United States, with the inscription "For God and Country."

1940 Census Shows 1,500,000 Marriages

WASHINGTON — A report of the Census Bureau reveals that marriages in the United States in 1940 totaled 1,500,000, the highest figure ever. The rate was 11.8 per 1,000 of population, surpassed only in 1920 when American soldiers were returning in large numbers from France. But last year's grand total topped that of 1920.

well as other nations. How can industry be readjusted to a peace basis? How will employment be provided for the soldiers when the time comes for them to lay down their arms? What role should government play in aiding the needy? If democracy faced a supreme test in arming itself against the threat of aggression, it will face a test no less momentous in adjusting itself to peacetime requirements.

No pattern or program has yet been suggested but certain trends are appearing. Great Britain, it is said, is closely approaching a modified socialist regime. Here in the United States there are indications that labor will demand a share in industrial management. The question of training workers for the complicated tasks modern industrial organization requires is even now being discussed. At the moment, of course, the all-embracing objective is to speed defense, but in the background these reconstruction questions are appearing. They will undoubtedly occupy the attention of Congress when peace is restored.

The most definite pattern for a world order is that drawn in the Pagan Encyclopaedia and the suggestions made by the Pope, beginning with Leo XIII, will probably have a conspicuous place in the deliberations when the time comes.
