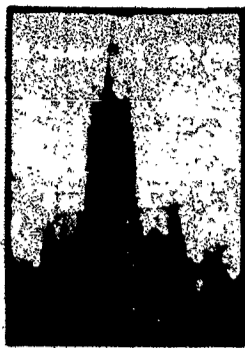

ANOTHER MYTH EXPLODED

Having been invited to dinner with the Jesuits of Ricci Hall, a hostel of Hong Kong University, the guest remained to hear a debate between English speaking Chinese students on the abolition of examinations. In describing the occasion afterwards, he wrote as follows:

"When the teams' arguments had ended, informal discussions ensued. Some of the audience sought to give their views. The polite, quick thinking and incisive speech of the majority was most interesting. One was particularly struck by certain fresh, vigorous similes, figures of speech and apt comparisons. It suddenly dawned on you that these boys were taking rich phrases of their native Chinese and translating them into English. I was struck by their energy and strength. For example, one of the boys asked, 'Why must a man and a woman end his career just because he failed to answer a particular set of questions? Would you not off your own fingers just because you couldn't untie a certain knot?'"

Father Byrne, general Irish Jesuit at Ricci Hall, a student of philosophy and psychology, asked the guest to address the students. "Somewhat hesitantly I gazed down into those alert Oriental faces, faces of youth eager to learn and wondering what started that foolish phrase about the inscrutable face of the Chinese. They fairly glowed with feeling and abundant good humor. I was struck by their energy and strength. For example, one of the boys asked, 'Why must a man and a woman end his career just because he failed to answer a particular set of questions? Would you not off your own fingers just because you couldn't untie a certain knot?'"

Ricci Hall was named for the Italian Jesuit, Matteo Ricci, who long ago drew the historic map of the world to prove to arrogant mandarins that there were other lands besides China. It was he too who first brought light to the Chinese mind. He thereby gained favor with the Emperor who appointed him eventually as official clock winder.

MOTHERS ENROLL SOLDIERS IN MOTHER-SETON GUILD

EMMITTSBURG, Md.—The Mother Seton Guild reports that it is at present receiving subscriptions for enrollment in the Guild from mothers who have sons in the armed forces of the United States and wish to place them under Mother Seton's care.

A letter from one mother disclosed by the guild, recalls Mother Seton's concern for the welfare of her own sons and calls her "a very human and understanding mother."

A Novena of Masses is being offered at Mother Seton's tomb in preparation for the Feast of the Assumption, August 15.

The process which will entitle Mother Elizabeth Seton to be called "Venerable" is now in its last stage, according to a communication received from His Eminence, Cardinal Patrick Joseph Heenan, C.M., Vice-Pastor of the Cause, on July 4, Cardinal Heenan said, "I am sure that the cause regarding the New Cultus of Mother Seton, 'We now pass another milestone in her Cause, and afterwards we shall take up the Apostolic process which will entitle her to be called 'Venerable'."

Heroism Of Convert Clergymen Praised

LONDON—Arnold Lunn, back in England after a visit to the United States asserted at the annual meeting of the Convert Aid Society that convert clergymen of the present day were martyrs whose heroism "is of a finer order than the heroism of those who have stuck out the bombardment of London."

The Convert Aid Society, whose secretary is F. W. Chamberlain, K.C.G. himself a convert clergyman, gives financial help to non-Catholic ministers who embrace the Faith. He reported the grants during the year totalled \$52,000—about \$12,000 less than in the previous year. Donations during the year decreased by about \$12,000.
