CLEARY UNIT — N.C.C.W. MASS CATHOLIC ACTION

Sees N.C.C.S. Program As Opportunity For Mass Catholic Action

DENVER, Aug. 8 — Declaring that the National Catholic Community Service program "gives us the greatest opportunity of mass Catholic Action that we have ever had," Vincent J. Little, N.C.C.S. field staff member, headed the keynote of the panel discussion on "National Catholic Community Service," held at the Rocky Mountain Regional Conference of the National Council of Catholic Women here.

The Rt. Rev. Migr. John F. Mulroy, Rocky Mountain Regional Chairman for U. S. C. O. and leader of the panel, said that "in the rapid expansion in the industrial areas in particular, now and in the future, the National Council of Catholic Women has one of the most serious responsibilities that has ever been faced by the organized Catholic women of America."

In discussing "Women's Part in National Defense," Miss Anne K. Hooley, instructor of the N. C. C. W. Women's Division, said her group is concerned with every factor of the present emergency that concerns the women and youth of the nation. "Particularly significant is the fact," Miss Hooley pointed out, "are the girls working in the defense industries. In a two-month survey of the industrial areas of New England, she found that practically all the women at work at salaries of \$18 or \$20 a week. After deducting their living expenses, she said, the girls often have less than the drafted, with most of his living expenses paid."

Cleary Veteran Unit Opens Negro Settlement House

The sign of the cross, distinguishing 398 Clarissa St., marks the official settlement house of the Cleary Veteran Mission Unit, of the U. S. M. C., opening in September. It is the ambition of this Catholic Unit to provide an organized educational, recreational religious training center for Negroes. The staff will consist of volunteer veterans.

Organized since December, 1940, the group is now composed of thirty-two young men and women from the Rochester diocese. In September two additional branches will be formed, their fields of concentration to be decided by the individual groups. The project will be financed through voluntary contributions, social run by diocesan organizations—integrated in the work, and by an annual appeal made by the Cleary Unit in support of one social function under their auspices.

To assure better visualization of the stage performance, the upholstered chairs in the auditorium are on a floor constructed with curvature with the rows of chairs sloping toward the stage. The auditorium has acoustical plaster ceilings and side walls and cork wallcovering. Indirect ceiling lighting, dimmer controlled has been installed. Youthful thespians at Our Lady of Mercy High School will be greatly encouraged in their presentation from the stage that awaits them. A massive gridiron supports the counter weight system for the complete interior and exterior settings. Stage lighting will be accomplished with borders and footlights and spot lights from the ceiling and from in front of the balcony. Modern Lighting. The stage switchboard is a Major Present switchboard with dimmer controlling all stage and auditorium lighting. Varied color effects desired are presented by means of simply pushing a button on the stage. On the first floor of the school will be an enlarged art room with special storage facilities; also the nurse's quarters for health examinations and special student treatment. A Journalism room, new to the high school, equipped for turning out the prize-winning publications of Our Lady of Mercy High School is on the second floor. There are also class rooms, the spacious and well-stocked library, faculty room, lounge and music practice room. The lounge with meeting rooms provides the length of the building and will be used for social and business gatherings of the school's growing business association.

On the third floor are classrooms, constant room, a music room and instrument storage room with cupboards designed for instruments and sheet music. One of the innovations in the music department this year will be a full time choral choir. To accommodate the growing student body, the former gymnasium has been combined with the cafeteria to make a well-lighted and ample cafeteria in the original building. All three buildings are connected with hallways. A striking feature on the first floor is the triptych shrine, a beautiful representation of the Visitation by Hermann J. Butler, noted church artist. It was on the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, July 2, 1940 that bids for the new structure were opened. Ground was broken for the building by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney in connection with the May Day exercises, last year. The new and greater Mercy High School will now accommodate 800 students. With the original building painted throughout the completed structure stands ready with the most modern equipment for carrying on and expanding the curriculum and extra-curricular activities described in the "Mercy High Edition" supplement to this edition. Every floor will have display cases. A complete sound and amplification system with speakers in all rooms, the auditorium and gymnasium will be controlled from the office. Installed also are a clock system, bell system, and fire alarm system. Driveways going around the building and touching at all entrances have been completed. Ample parking space will be provided. In addition to the commodious and modern equipped buildings, the students have large lawns, a grove of the Blessed Virgin outdoors and ample room for outdoor recreation periods.
