

# Catholic Women Are Called To Unified Action Amid Crisis

DENVER—A call to Catholic women of the United States to accelerated organized activity for God and country was made here by the Most Rev. Louis B. Kueera, Bishop of Lincoln, in an address at the Rocky Mountain Conference of the National Council of Catholic Women.

One of several members of the hierarchy to speak at the conference which opened Tuesday, Bishop Kueera stressed the need for unified action among Catholic women in this hour of crisis. He said that the women of the United States must be united in their efforts to meet the challenges of the present and the future.

Approximately 200 delegates attended the regional assembly which was held at the Hotel Lincoln in Denver. The conference was the first of a series of meetings to be held in the Rocky Mountain region during the year.

# Mission Imposes New Obligations

New York, Aug. 11—The increasing responsibilities of American Catholics toward the missions as a result of the war in Europe were emphasized in a radio address Sunday by the Rev. Aloysius F. Coogan, National Secretary of the Missionary Union of the Clergy and Editor of Catholic Missions. His talk on "The Missionary Church in a Changing World" was broadcast over a national network.

At 1,000 souls is about the maximum pastoral responsibility any missionary can assume over and above his work of preaching the Gospel to non-Christians, he said. "There should be an annual increase of at least 500 priests in the missionary ranks each year without making any allowance for those who die or return to their native lands."

There follows a long period of preparation and of trial, and at last when everything in the candidate is well disposed the Church confers Holy Orders and his superiors destine him for the missions."

"In the making of the missionary everything comes from above. The call must be an answer to prayer. 'Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth laborers into his harvest.' The growth of a vocation is helped by sound religious instruction and education by the frequenting of the Sacraments and a fervent Christian life, by sympathy with the needs of souls by seeking advice in order to learn the will of God by encouragement and by the material aid needed to realize the ideal. We in countries where the Church is already established must encourage and foster vocations for the missions."
