COURIER'S CURRENT CINEMA COMMENTS

"The Stars Look Down"—A-2

A fine, uncompromisingly honest picture—one of the most notable to come out of England—"The Stars Look Down" is one of those memorable adventures in a theater that should not be missed. Although the lack of well-known cast names has so worried exhibitors that they have put "Stars Look Down" on the lower half of their double bills, it will easily make a high spot on almost anybody's ten best list at the end of the year. The picture is a dramatization of the novel by A. J. Cronin, author of "The Citadel" and more recently, of "Keys of the Kingdom," which was discussed in a recent Courier by Father Benedict Edmund Cronin. It must be presumed, knows a little more about life among the Welsh miners, the subject of the picture, than he knows about the Roman Catholic church.

"The Stars Look Down" is the story of a people—the coal miners living out their drab lives, wanting only to exist. Two of them, David Fawcett and Joe Cleveland, break away from the life—David, in order to get an education and to be able to help his people—Joe, because he wants money and flash. These roles are eloquently played by Michael Redgrave and Emily Williams. Margaret Lockwood is real as the selfish, cheap little city girl, who breaks under life as a miner's wife. Nancy Price gives an unforgettable characterization of an embittered mother afraid to show tenderness or feeling. But every unfamiliar name in the cast means a performance that characterizes a people. The picture is a masterpiece, however briefly the "Stars Look Down" is predominantly a profoundly moving drama—but it has its grim humor, its suspense. In it, Carol Reed, director of "Night Train," has made one of the important pictures of this or any other year.

More Fun in Haunted Houses

The current revival of Bob Hope's "Cat and the Canary," brings the total of pictures about comics in mysterious mansions to three. The others are "Hold That Ghost" and "Whistling in the Dark."

"Hold That Ghost"—A-1

This is the third in the Abbott-Kostello series, made shortly after "Buck Privates," but without until "In the Navy" had a chance to cash in on the popularity of service comedies. It is wildly slapstick and for the most part, amusing, although there are long dull stretches in the proceedings. Richard Carlson, Joan Davis, Evelyn Ankers and others contribute, but it is Lou Costello, the plaintive rhy-poly, who keeps the level of entertainment generally high.

"Whistling in the Dark"—A-1

This is more talkative, less slapstick, than "Hold That Ghost," but it is amusing, too, even though its secret passage-sliding panel episode seems dragged in by the ears. It is a remake of the 1932 film of the popular play, modernized and switched slightly, but the same in essence. Primarily, it has been remade as the first starring vehicle of Red Skelton, who has long been a popular vaudeville comedienne. Although the dialogue is often less than hilarious, Skelton registers solidly. But if you have seen the picture or play before you'll find many dull spots. In the end, the humor isn't heavy enough to fill up the holes.

"Private Nurse"—A-2

Maybe they mean to make a series, on the Dr. Kildare line, carrying the characters of "Private Nurse" on to further cases. If they have any such thoughts, they have to do something about the writing. "Private Nurse" is a muddled thing, bogged down with maudlin clichés. About the dialogue and situations is the aroma of rich, ripe corn. Brenda Joyce and Jane Darwell are the Kildare and Gillespie among nurses, with Ann Todd giving a good juvenile performance. But next to "Private Nurse" those morning housewife radio serials are masterpieces of the drama.

Another One of Those Things

Here's the third entry in the Scripta-You'll-See-Again division—the comedy-drama about the rich girl, who runs away from home because her father wants to (1) prevent her marriage; (2) force her marriage; Ever since "It Happened One Night," this has been a winner. With variations, they have been doing it for a long time. "The Bride Came C. O. D." is probably the latest, but far from the last, example.

Now you are a script-writer and they tell you that Florabelle Filmstar needs a comedy after all the heavy stuff she has been doing. And they are going to co-star her with the popular Martin Matinee-doll. You can't go wrong with this story then. Colbert, Gable, Davis, Cagney, Hepburn, Grant, MacDonald, Tracy, Eddley, March, Elington and other big stars, not to mention any number of Wendy Barries and Gene Raymond have done the stint. Of course, in order to show off Florabelle's ability for wearing clothes, you want to start it off with her all alone and lonely on her magnificent estate. She wants to marry Duke Fossil, but wealthy father won't allow it, because the Duke is a fortune hunter. So doing her simplest Schiaparelli, Florabelle escapes her father's guards and runs away. Pretending to be a working girl named Floppy Smith, she starts out. Sometimes she does actually go to work, but as a rule she takes a bus or starts to hitch-hike. On the way across the country, she meets Martin. He's very handsome, of course, poor but honest and just bubbling over with whimsy. Well, Florabelle has some trouble and Martin helps her out. That's what throws them together. Of course, he doesn't know that she is rich stuff and she treats her just like any other girl. It takes some time for Florabelle

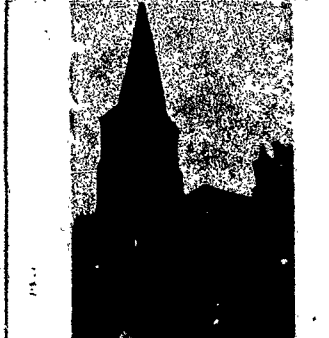
Something To Watch For
