### Bible Campaign Success Brings Thanks

**Copies of New Bibles For Servicemen Urged By Holy Name Union**

The gratifying success of the Revised New Testament distribution of members of Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union has brought the commendation of His Excellency, the Most Rev. Edwin V. O'Hara, chairman of the National New Testament Committee of the Holy Name Society.

In a personal letter to the Rev. William F. Stauder, the Union's Spiritual Director, Bishop O'Hara states in part:

"Biblical Sunday is history but the good which it has accomplished will endure.

"The results, while still incomplete, have already greatly exceeded our most sanguine hopes. This accomplishment is a testimonial and a tribute to the efficiency, loyalty and devotion of the diocesan chairman and their committees.

"I would wish to express personally the appreciation of the Episcopal Committee for your excellent work, but, for the present, at least this letter must suffice.

"Thank you! God Bless you! You will always be in my prayers. As a remembrance of Biblical Sunday and your contributions thereto, I am sending you a special deluxe copy of the New Testament.

"We are grateful for the unprecedented distribution already attained. The present achievement confirms our belief that we can ultimately attain our objective of the New Testament in Every Catholic Home. May we hope for your continued assistance in this endeavor."

Acting promptly on the suggestion of the Episcopal National Chairman, the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union officers have sent out a letter over the signature of Father Stauder, spiritual director, Frank E. Wolfe, president, and Lewis A. Schur, secretary, to pastors telling of the success of the distribution and asking their cooperation in direct sale of the book.

The Holy Name officers state that in the Rochester Diocese, reports indicate a much larger demand for the New Testament than was originally anticipated, particularly after the work was seen by the people.

One of the Rochester parishes disposed of 400 copies, while reports of sales in the city of 200 copies have been general.

Send to Servicemen

As an incentive to further sales of the New Testament, the Holy Name leaders are suggesting that parents, relatives and friends could fill a crying need by supplying copies to Catholic men in the service.

The National New Testament Committee, Holy Name Society, 141 East 45th St., New York City, it is stated, will gladly mail copies direct to the camps for \$1.00 per copy, including mailing costs, with the name of the donor inscribed thereon.

Following the suggestion of the national committee, the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union urges all diocesan and parish societies to cooperate in additional distribution of the Revised New Testament by calling the book to the attention of their members at meetings and in their regular notices.

**Elmira CYO Baseball Champs Feted By K. of C. Council**

NEW YORK — The failure of statement of this and other nations to recognize the cardinal principles of morality and justice in disclosing their war and peace aims was criticized in a resolution adopted at the closing sessions of the 80th annual convention of the Catholic Central Verein, here last Wednesday. Several thousand delegates from many sections of the country attended the sessions for the last five days at the Hotel Commodore.

Besides regretting the omission of the name of God from the Roosevelt-Churchill eight point peace proposal, the delegates advocated a peace with justice and charity, based upon recent Papal pronouncements.

Delegates of the National Catholic Woman's Union, who held their annual convention at the same time, opposed the compulsory government service for women, as recently urged by Mrs. Roosevelt. This proposal was characterized as "a hideous example of the rising tide of bureaucracy in government" and "at best, a very rash and needless sociological experiment, fraught with moral, social and political dangers."

Prefacing their resolutions on "after war problems" with the statement that "the winning of the present war will only be supreme importance provided a just and permanent peace be established," the delegates declared:

It is significant in this connection that in the recent past, since Russia transferred its allegiance from one belligerent to another, the liberty of religion was dropped from the list of liberties, the restoration and firm establishment of which had formerly been proclaimed as a peace aim.

Domination by the Federal Government and the State to the detriment of the individual was scored on other resolutions, one which urged:

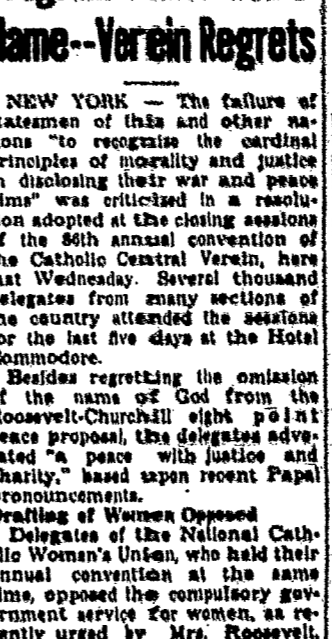
That the corporate principle of social organization, according to which the individual, the vocational corporations, the State and society will have specific limitations, would seem a far better alternative to excessive State control of all political, economic and social activities.

Pointing to the possibility of "the elimination of the middle class" as a result of a trend toward "a numerous proletariat on the one hand and a small group of extremely rich men" it was requested that "individual and agencies charged with the administration of the defense program grant consideration to the just demands of the small enterprisers who contribute so largely to the wealth and welfare of the nation."

"Federalized medicine" was opposed as tending "to weaken the social and moral responsibility of the public in general." Instead, such agencies as group hospitalization and health plans, maternity guilds, or medical and hospital care provided by benevolent societies" were urged.

Speed, And More Speed. That's The Formula For Eddie Cantor's New Show



"Speed, and more speed" is the motto of Eddie Cantor's "Time to Smile" program.

And that will remain the motto when the post-war comedian returns in high gear, with his new series which starts September 3, from New York.

"Time to Smile" has been termed the "fastest half-hour on the air" and "the hour that's worth a half-hour" because Cantor insists on maintaining a tempo that leaves the audience on edge, and waiting more.

"I have no particular 'radio formula,'" says Eddie. "All the listener laughs along with us if he can quote one line the next day, he'll tune in next week. We've never lost a listener in the history of the show. It's the fact that there are youngsters around. Keep the show clean. Keep it happy."

"Dinah Shore appeals to the youth and high school and college students. We see that she is surrounded with songs that will keep their feet happy."

"I'm not in favor of using an army of stoppers, because they can confuse the listeners and retard the tempo of the broadcast. Harry Van Zell does a half-hour of characterizations which are as good as anything else before the microphone today. Dinah, despite the fact that she is a Southerner, can put over a Brooklynese type better than anyone I've ever met."

### NEW SISTERHOOD IN WANT

**Needed for Defense of Faith**

One of the most flourishing mission fields under our care is the Molankara province of Malabar on the West Coast of India. It consists of the Archdiocese of Trivandrum and the diocese of Trivandrum, presided over by Archbishop Mar Ivanios and Bishop Mar Theophilus, both of whom are converts. So numerous have been the converts received into the Church that these Bishops and their Priests find it impossible to minister to all of them. Additional workers had to be obtained.

As so often in the history of the Church, the solution was a religious order of women to act as teachers, catechists and nurses for the poor. The venerable Father Joseph Kughinjilal was appointed to organize the group and act as chaplain and spiritual director. Father Kughinjilal writes:

"Divine Providence has sent me many young women to dedicate their lives in Holy Religion, to teach the Faith and help the poor. Permission has been given to these young women to live as a religious community. They are to be known as the Daughters of Mary. They observe the rule of the Third Order of St. Francis.

"My worry now is to provide a convent house. The spirit of these young novices is so supernatural. They just seek a place to sleep and a roof over their heads.

"I hope and pray, Father, some good generous person will provide a house for these heroic young women. A suitable dwelling could be purchased for about 1,500 American Dollars."

### Unique Rites Mark Eastern Catholic Retreat Held Here

From August the fourteenth to the seventeenth, unique services were held in St. Joseph's Ukrainian Catholic Church on Hudson Avenue. St. Joseph's Church is a Catholic Church of the Byzantine Rite for people of Ukrainian nationality. It is under the jurisdiction of the Most Rev. Constantine (Kostelnyk) of Philadelphia, who is the Bishop of all the Ukrainian Greek Catholics in the United States. The Rev. Basil Turula, 312 Hudson Avenue, is the pastor of St. Joseph's Church.

A retreat was preached there in English for the benefit of the young people by a specialist in Oriental Church sciences, a priest of the Roman Rite, the Rev. Clement C. Englert, C. S. L., of St. Elizabeth's, a member of the faculty at St. Mary's College, North East Pa.

On Thursday evening August 14 at 7:30 P. M. Father Englert opened the retreat with a sermon on the all-important necessity of saving one's soul. The preacher developed the idea that the only index of successful living is the endeavor to get to heaven on Friday evening the retreat-master, discoursed on the transcendent beauty of the Byzantine Rite explaining the gorgeous symbolism of its ceremonies and the splendor of its traditions. This topic was especially interesting to the fairly numerous group of people of the Roman Rite who attended.

The retreat was held on Thursday evening, Father Englert spoke of Holy Communion as the divinely given remedy against all of life's woes and trials.

Byzantine Prayer-Service

Each evening the sermon was preceded by a Byzantine Prayer-Service called a Molieben. On Thursday evening the Molieben was in honor of the Sacred Heart. On Friday and Saturday evenings it was in honor of Our Blessed Lady crowned with seven stars. The service is patterned on the Mass of the Catechumens; the sermon was preached. Then followed the continuation of the Molieben in the form of a beautiful litany and prayers, and then Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in the Eastern Rite form was given. The Blessed Sacrament enclosed in a ciborium crowned with seven stars is taken from the tabernacle and placed upon the altar table. The priest then incenses it thrice, spacing each incensation with a profound bow. He then sings the poignant beautiful "Supplications and petitions" sung by the priest in plaintive chant and sung in response by the whole congregation in harmony.

They conclude with the invocation to Our Lady, St. Joseph and St. John the Baptist. The Blessed Sacrament is incensed again with the same profoundly reverential bows.

The priest dons a humeral veil and ascending the altar, he takes the ciborium in his covered hands, and turning toward the people, he holds it up before his face and sings the words solemnly "Save O Lord Thy people." The whole congregation repeats it after him. Then he sings it again on a higher note. The congregation repeats it. The third time the priest intones it but continues with the phrase, "and bless Thine inheritance," meanwhile making the sign of the cross over the people three times. As the choir intones a hymn of praise and petition, the priest incenses the Blessed Sacrament again and places it in the tabernacle. After the Benediction service Saturday evening, a Panachida or prayer-service for the Poor Souls was sung.

Each evening Father Englert heard confessions in English and Father Turula in Ukrainian. Each morning there was a Holy Mass in the Roman Rite celebrated by Father Englert, and one in the Byzantine Rite celebrated by Father Turula.

Pamphlet Distributed

A pamphlet written by the retreat-master entitled "Eastern Catholics" was on sale during the retreat. This pamphlet, published by the Paulist Press presents in a simple, popular style in six short chapters, all that a Catholic of either rite wants to know about the Eastern Catholic Churches and their various laws and ceremonies. The retreat was brought to a close.
