Half Million Bibles Sold

Discussion Club Outline Planned

KANNAH CITY (NC) — More than half a million copies of the Revised Challoner Rheims New Testament have been sold since the Confraternity edition was released in June for general distribution, the Most Rev. Edwin V. O'Hara, Bishop of Kansas City and Chairman of the Episcopal Committee of the Confraternity, announced today.

Orders continue to be received, he said, from all parts of the United States. In view of this wide-spread circulation the Episcopal Committee of the Confraternity of Christendom has recommended the New Testament as a religious discussion club text so that the laity may enjoy learning from Sacred Scripture of Christ, the Son of God and of His love for all men, the Bishop added.

To make practical this recommendation the Episcopal Committee of the Confraternity has directed the preparation of a series of discussion club outlines for use with the New Testament. Assistance in the development of the series are the Rev. Gregory Smith, of Denver, National Chairman for Confraternity of Christian Doctrine discussion clubs, the Rt. Rev. J. William L. Newton, of Cleveland, Secretary of the Editorial Board of the Catholic Biblical Association of America, and other scholars, organizers and leaders with a broad discussion club experience.

Based on Revised Edition The outlines are based on the New Testament, Confraternity edition. The introductions preceding each of the 27 books, the glossary, notes and colored-annotated-maps are utilized throughout the series. Scripture passages for group reading are developed through the use of maps, pictures, discussion aids, correlation with the liturgy and suggested religious practices.

This Christ is presented as a divine personality and also as a historic reality. "The New Testament Series" is outlined in three parts. Part I, "The Life of Christ," are based on the four Gospels and present a glowing picture of the scenes, teachings and power of our Saviour. Part II, "The History of the Apostolic Church," outlines the early development and growth of the Church as revealed in the Acts of the Apostles.

Includes 100 Illustrations The three Parts are illustrated with 100 historically accurate four-color pictures by the artist, L. Jambor. The provinces, cities and other geographical sites named in the scriptural passages for group reading are listed at the beginning of each chapter. In order that the Gospel narrative may be more intelligible, members refer briefly to the New Testament maps to visualize the scenes and to the events. To promote an analysis of the text and a retelling by members of the words and works of Christ and His Apostles, discussion aids follow the scriptural references.

In each chapter of the outline, under Liturgy the feasts of the Church are listed with scriptural references indicating the Gospel to be read in the Mass of the feast. The aim being to encourage members of the group to participate more actively in the External Sacrifice.

PLAN TO PUBLISH PRIEST'S THESIS ON CLOSED SHOP

WASHINGTON — The dissertation of the Rev. Jerome L. Toner, O.S.B., of St. Martin's Abbey, Lacey, Wash., on "The Closed Shop in the American Labor Movement," presented to the Catholic University of America for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, is soon to be published by the American Council on Public Affairs.

Father Toner has spent the last eight years in the arduous and intensive research and in interviewing representatives of government, labor and employers on the closed shop issue. His dissertation is the first complete study of the subject and there was only one authoritative treatment of it prior to this.

Hugh O'Donnell Leaves \$2,000 To Notre Dame NEW YORK — The University of Notre Dame is a beneficiary under the will of Hugh A. O'Donnell, former assistant business manager of the New York Times, who died August 31. A bequest of \$2,000 is made to the University to establish an annual medal award for the highest ranking senior student in the School of Journalism.

Rev. Hinch, Dominican Preacher General, Dead NEWARK, N. J. — The Very Rev. John A. Hinch, O.P., a Preacher General of the Dominicans, died Tuesday at St. Antonius' Priory in 1940 and has lived at the Priory since he was born in New York since his emigration 10 years ago. Between 1905 and 1931 he was Prior successively of five Dominican communities, including six years as Prior of St. Antonius.

Catholic Hour' Message SATAN'S IDENTITY DEEP IN HISTORY SAYS MSGR. O'CONNOR

NEW YORK—(N. C.)—The soul of man "never lives alone: it is not an isolationist," the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Martin J. O'Connor, pastor of St. Peter's Cathedral, Scranton, Pa., declared Sunday night in the first of a series of four addresses on the "Catholic Hour." The subject of his address is "The Rights of the Oppressed."

Private instruction "The private instruction by parents or by those delegated by parents, if it be sound, should inculcate a proper appreciation of the value of marriage, that reverent appreciation as subject to the laws of God. All actions are subject to God's laws. Sex actions do not concern merely the individuals of the domestic society of the home. They primarily regard the entire society. The general failure to accept and to be guided by this law of nature and of God is accountable, in large measure, for the loose sex morals of the home and for the sex mania of society today.

"A technical or clinic-story treatment of the fundamental and precautionary instruction for the treatment of sexual life entrusted to us as sacred heritage by the Almighty Creator is out of place in the theater where there is an atmosphere rather of entertainment than of reverence.

Relative to sex instruction, the late Pius XI of happy memory in his Encyclical on the Christian Education of Youth wrote as follows: "Another very grave danger is that natural which nowadays invades the field of education: that most delicate matter of purity of morals. Far too common is the error of those who with dangerous propagation of an ugly form of prudishness, called prudishness, falsely imagining they can forearm youth against the dangers of sensuality by means purely natural, such as a foolhardy initiation and precautionary instruction for all indiscriminately even in public; and, worse still, by exposing them at an early age to the occasions, in order to accustom them, to be argued, and as it were to harden them against such dangers. Inborn Weakness

"Such persons grievously err in refusing to recognize the inborn weakness of human nature and the law of which the Apostle speaks fighting against the law of mind (Romans vii. 23), and also in ignoring the experience of facts, from which it is clear that particularly in young people, evil tendencies are the effect not so much of ignorance of intellect as of weakness of a will exposed to dangerous occasions and unsupported by the means of grace.

"In this extremely delicate matter, if all things considered, some private instruction is found necessary and opportune from those who hold from God the commission to teach and who have the grace of state, every precaution must be taken. Such precautions are well known in traditional Christian education.

"It is earnestly and prayerfully hoped that the motion picture industry, which, aware of its great social responsibility, has in the past, extended a prudent vigilance in fostering programs proper for the entertainment motion picture theater, will not only refrain from admitting the function of the theater to be perverted by the intrusion of improper screen material but will strive, even more assiduously than in the recent past, to avoid any and all recessions from the right standard of morality and public decency in motion picture entertainment."

Ukrainian Seminary Cornerstone Laid STANFORD, Conn. — With the Most Rev. Constantine Bohachewsky, Bishop of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Diocese, officiating, the cornerstone of the Ukrainian Seminary here was laid in the presence of many members of the clergy and laity of the Eastern States.

Novena To Martyrs LOS ANGELES — A novena of prayers to the 51 Catholics martyred at Babastro, Spain, by Leftists in the early days of the civil war in that country is enjoying ever-increasing popularity and has run into a second edition. The novena has been compiled by the Rev. James Tort, C.M.F., pastor of Our Lady of Solitude Church here, and has been approved by the Most Rev. John J. Cantwell, Archbishop of Los Angeles.

High Scouting Award NEW YORK — In recognition of his eight years of service as Director of the National Catholic Committee on Scouting, the Rev. Dr. Edward Roberts Moore, pastor of St. Peter's Church here, has received a gold diamond-studded cross, the highest award in Catholic scouting. The cross was presented to Dr. Moore by the Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

Catholic Guidance Given In Current Events By Verein

(Because of the profound deliberation given resolutions of the Catholic Central Verein and their timeliness, they will be reproduced in this column from time to time.)

The Holy Father and the Present Emergency ST. LOUIS — An earnest plea that the heads of the warring nations heed the admonitions of Pope Pius XII was made by the Catholic Central Verein of America at its 86th annual convention held in St. Louis City on Aug. 16-20.

The organization urged that at the close of the war justice as well as charity be the guiding principles of the peace conference.

Text of the resolution follows: "The Catholic Central Verein of America on the occasion of its 86th annual convention pledges its loyalty and filial devotion to the beloved Holy Father, Pope Pius XII.

"As the Father of Christendom, his paternal solicitude extends not only to the members of his vast flock, but to all the peoples of the earth, regarded by him as children of our Heavenly Father and brethren of our Divine Savior, Jesus Christ. With sorrowing heart must he witness the destitution, distress, and cruelties afflicting his spiritual children, because the sins of men and the broken pledges of their nations' leaders have once again plunged mankind into fearful war.

"The Ecyclicals and exhortations of Pope Pius XII are a challenge to all men and women of good will to join in the crusade to bring about peace, to help reconstitute society in accordance with the principles of justice and charity for all nations, all races and all individuals. The Sovereign Pontiff has recalled to our attention the great principles that should serve as guides for the solution of problems relating to marriage, the family, education and the State.

"We would urge the heads of all nations to heed the pleas of the Vicar of Christ, to effect a peace with justice and charity. We would especially pray that, when the war shall have come to an end, charity as well as justice will be taken into full account by the statesmen participating in the peace conference, which will determine the destiny of nations for years to come.

"Ever mindful of the noble traditions of the Central Verein, we will endeavor to disseminate the principles and counsels intended by the Holy Father to lead men to domestic peace, in order that sound ideas and the will to promote a sound social order may permeate both the classes and the masses, impelling them wholeheartedly to cooperate for mutual understanding, prosperity and contentment.

"We shall not cease to support our Holy Father by our prayers, sacrifices and works, in order that all nations may adopt and follow the principles of the moral code, so that the 'black paganism' to which Pope Pius XII has referred may not prevail. We shall pray further that God may restore wisdom to a contrite people and bless us again with an era of peace prosperity and happiness founded upon the principles of a correct Christian way of life."

Laud Labor Defense BOSTON — The Executive Committee of the Newspaper Guild of Boston, at a meeting Wednesday, unanimously adopted a resolution commending and congratulating the Rev. John F. Cronin, S.S., for his "courageous and forthright" defense of labor in his recent series of radio addresses on the "Catholic Hour."

Requiem For Cardinal NEW YORK — A Solemn Pontifical Mass of Requiem in commemoration of the third anniversary of the death of Patrick Cardinal Hayes, fifth Archbishop of New York was celebrated in St. Patrick's Cathedral by the Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, present Archbishop. Six hundred clergy and Religious were among the 2,000 who attended the service. A eulogy on the late Cardinal was delivered by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph P. Donohue, Vicar General of the Archdiocese.
