Nazareth College Plans Courses To Aid Defense

A large Freshman Class will meet for the first time at nine o'clock on Tuesday morning, September 16 at the College Buildings on Augustus Street. The new students will be entertained by their Junior Sister Class on Tuesday afternoon and evening at Manteau Beach.

Formal opening of the college on Wednesday morning, September 17 will begin with a Mass at the Holy Ghost to be celebrated by the Rev. Leonard A. Kelly, Professor of Theology.

There is an awareness in the hearts of all Nazareth students that the College opens on the old campus for the many times. This year also marks the completion of teacher preparation for High School Academic subjects in a four-year period. Five years will hereafter be required by the State of New York for such training. The College is happy to note that a larger proportion of its students has been placed this year in fields for which they were trained than in several years past.

With the opening of this Academic year Nazareth College announces as follows an interesting program designed to further National Defense.

This program is based on the assumption that National Defense must be built up not only by well-trained and well-equipped armies and marines, highly armored tanks, bombing planes, submarines and air staff which, he said, "will come more, reality will our country be saved by generations of men and women whose bodies have been trained to endure ordinary or extraordinary stress, whose characters have been formed along the lines of integrity, high loyalty and whose hearts and wills have learned to seek and follow truth and justice and right."

"Therefore, the program on National Defense which will be developed by the college is to be the system of student cooperative government directed in a special way toward patriotism.

"Courses of study are planned to emphasize the American way and to advance the fields of Religion, Philosophy, Social Studies, Education, Science, Social Work and Foreign Languages.

One hour a week will be reserved for talks by specialists giving information and inspiration for National Defense.

The Forum and the radio will also be used as a means of vital instruction. Student activities relating to such as the Red Cross, about program are also being arranged. The college is looking forward to the opening of the great Nazareth on East Avenue in Pittsford the buildings of which are well on the way to completion.

"Already the Association has had one achievement to its credit and that is the formation of a 'Catholic Welfare Bureau' within the I. Apostolate and headed by a trained social worker brought up especially from Melbourne, Miss Blackall.

"But the most wonderful news I have kept till last. A priest, Rev. Father James Murtough sub-editor of the 'Advocate' at the Melbourne Catholic paper is going to study at the School of Social Services in Washington D. C. It is announced by Girl Scout national headquarters.

It is the policy of the Girl Scout national organization it was explained, to "lend" staff members to cooperating organizations when Girl Scout work permits.

Miss Sullivan, a graduate of Trinity College and a director of the Trinity College Alumnae Association, is an adviser on professional work for the Girl Scouts and has been active in Girl Scouting for a number of years.

Her first work for the organization began in Puerto Rico where she held the position of Insular Director of the Girl Scouts. In addition, to her regular Girl Scouting activities, Miss Sullivan conducted courses in group leadership at the University of Puerto Rico and later at a number of colleges in the United States.

Concerning her work in Puerto Rico, Miss Sullivan commented: "Ever since my pleasant two years in Puerto Rico, I have been especially eager to aid in the development of better understanding between North and South America. I am vitally interested in the social programs of the South American countries and have watched with satisfaction the growth of the social work profession there."

In addition to her work with the Girl Scouts, Miss Sullivan has been active in social work, having taken a particular interest in the Casita Maria Settlement House in New York City's Harlem.

Honor Blessed Mother At Academy's Memorial Shrine

"In Memory, Sister M. Marcella, 1882-1940, her faculty and her girls, 1941."

Faith of the Nativity of Our Blessed Mother was appropriately marked before the outdoor shrine commemorating the late Sister M. Marcella, principal of Nazareth Academy, with a religious service, Monday night.

Three hundred persons, parents, students, graduates and friends of the Academy assembled for the service, first to be held at the shrine since it was blessed in May, 1941 by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney.

Following Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament at the shrine the Rev. J. Joseph O'Connell, chaplain of the academy, speaking in the auditorium, paid tribute to the late principal and her staff which, he said, "will continue to carry on the great traditions of Sister Marcella."

Those present then wended their way from the school building to the shrine located on the south side of the school grounds in a woodland setting. Here before this memorial to Sister Marcella, modeled after the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes in France, the services took place.

The memorial shrine is called the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes in memory of Sister Marcella, Sister M. Hubertine, her successor explained. A plaque bears the inscription given above.

Erected with funds contributed by the students the shrine contains a stone brought from the far-famed Lourdes Shrine in France, a stone from old St. Patrick's Cathedral and a third stone from the old Nazareth Academy which was located in Jay St.

Sister Marcella died Sept. 17, 1940.
