Magazine's Photo Caption Calls For Protest

I had bought my first copy of the magazine Life to see an article it carried on conditions and morale in an army camp selected as representative. When I had read the article of reference I naturally turned over its pages to see what more would interest me.

I do not like these profusely illustrated magazines.

Their pictures too often border on the obscene, sometimes cross the border. But even for that reason an examination of one of them is of interest. It shows the character of the mental and moral pabulum served weekly to millions of our people. This Life I did find another article that interested me, and a picture that disgusted me. I might say horrified me (Life, Aug. 18).

The article is a description in print and picture of "Old Bermuda." "These homonymously named," says the writer, "have become a U. S. defense bastion... white roads and roof-top, blue-green sea and brilliant garrulous talk. The remainder are largely pure Negro."

That description of the people is true only of the people in the principal island of the group, where the white population is made up of British officials and their families, and the descendants of such people.

Speaking of "the long-isolated St. David's Island," he adds: "They are descendants of Irishmen exiled to Bermuda by Cromwell, American Indians sold into slavery, and Negroes." He gives a picture of a young girl on horseback, apparently 15 or 16 years of age and of distinctly Irish features. The color of her skin does not, of course, appear in the picture.
