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QUERIES and REPLIES

WHY do you Catholics not baptize by immersion? That is the only right way to administer the Sacrament. In the mind of the Church three things are necessary for Baptism. All three of these must be present simultaneously. 1. The intention to baptize, that is to do what Christ commanded to be done. 2. The proper form of words, that is, the Sacrament must be administered in the name of the Blessed Trinity. 3. The application of water on the person baptizing.

Regarding the application of water, the Church teaches that this may be done equally well by immersion, by aspersion, or by effusion. The only condition required is that water actually come in contact with some part of the body of the person to be baptized. In the early centuries of the Church Baptism by immersion was the ordinary method of administering the Sacrament. In later times, effusion or pouring has become the ordinary though not exclusive method of administration. Any one of the three methods will suffice for the Sacrament.

The very fact that Baptism is necessary for salvation proves that immersion is not the only method allowed by our Lord. Should men in prison, the sick and the infirm, soldiers fighting on the battlefield, children just born and at the point of death, the Eskimo of the Arctic Circle or the Arab of the desert be allowed to die without Baptism just because immersion is impossible?

And yet our Lord has said, "Unless a man be born again of water and the Holy Ghost he cannot enter into the Kingdom of Heaven" (John 3, 5). It seems hardly possible that St. Peter could have immersed eight thousand converts in two days (Acts 2, 41; 4, 4) even if he had the water. Any one who knows the topography of the Holy Land is well aware that the little stream Kedron at no time had water enough to immerse anybody. Certain it is that from the earliest days of Christianity Baptism by effusion and aspersion were considered equally valid with Baptism by immersion.

Tertullian describes Baptism as "a sprinkling with any kind of water" (De Bapt., c. 6). Saint Augustine says that Baptism forgives sins even if the water "merely sprinkles the child ever so slightly" (In Joan., 80, 3). Eusebius tells us that invalids are to be baptized by the pouring of water" (Hist. Eccles., 4, 43). The Doctrine of the Twelve Apostles commonly called the Didache and written before the year 100 treats of this subject in the following words: "Baptism in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost in running water; but if thou has no running water baptize in other water, and if thou canst not get cold, then in warm. But if thou has neither, pour water three times on the head in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" (Doctrina XII Apost. c. 7). Baptism then may be validly administered in any of the three ways just described. The ordinary minister of Baptism is the priest but in case of emergency any one may and should administer the Sacrament. Even an unbeliever may act as minister of the Sacrament of Baptism provided he employs water and the proper form of words and has the intention of doing what Christ commanded to be done. Playoffs Loom For 'Wings'

Rested, ready and on edge, the Red Wings already are battling the Newark Bears in the International League playoffs, officially titled the Governors' Cup Series. Barring postponements at Newark, where the first two games were scheduled, the Wings and Bears will open the Rochester end of the series Thursday night at Red Wing Stadium, where three games will be played.

This series marks Rochester's seventh appearance in the nine-year-old post-season combats and the ninth for Newark, which has made the playoff grade each year since the series was inaugurated in 1933. However, the Wings have what might be called a psychological advantage, as they are the only club to hold an advantage over the Bears in playoff combats, leading two games to eight.

Every follower of the Wings remembers that historic series with the Bears two years ago, when Estel Crabtree's clutch home run secured seeming elimination for the Rochesterers and sent them on to victory on a bright Sunday afternoon, when Herschel Lyons out-pitched Max Maceo in a 2-1 thriller that decided the series.

It is no secret that Johnny Neun and his Bears were queuing for Jersey City to beat out the Wings for fourth place, and the reason is apparent in the season's records. The Wings were the only foe to play the Bears even over the regular season and the only club to whip the new champions in both games of a doubleheader.

Interest in this series is running high and indications point to a big crowd when the Wings come home Thursday to battle the Bears for the right to meet the winner of the Buffalo-Montreal series and a place in the Little World Series.
