In the first lecture, Dr. Albers, now minister of Panama to the United States will analyze the clash of cultures involved in the Good Neighbor Policy.

Dr. Adler of the University of Chicago, who is known for his other lectures given in Rochester, will speak on "The Demonstration of Democracy."

The way to "Human Happiness" will be the topic of Father Farrell's lecture. Father Farrell who is on the Catholic University faculty is co-author with Dr. Adler of a volume on Democracy.

Professor Forester, educator, writer and diplomat will discuss "My Personal Recollections of 60 Years of German Policy." The Archduke Felix who has visited Rochester recently will speak on "Europe, Today and Tomorrow."

Frank J. Sheed, a member of the publishing firm of Sheed and Ward, and also a former visitor here will discuss "The New Apostolate." The topic of Jacques Maritain for the April 12 lecture has not been announced but he is recognized throughout the world as a foremost exponent of the scholastic philosophy of St. Thomas.

Over 75 prominent laypeople have given their assistance to the series as patrons. The series is a non-profit venture.

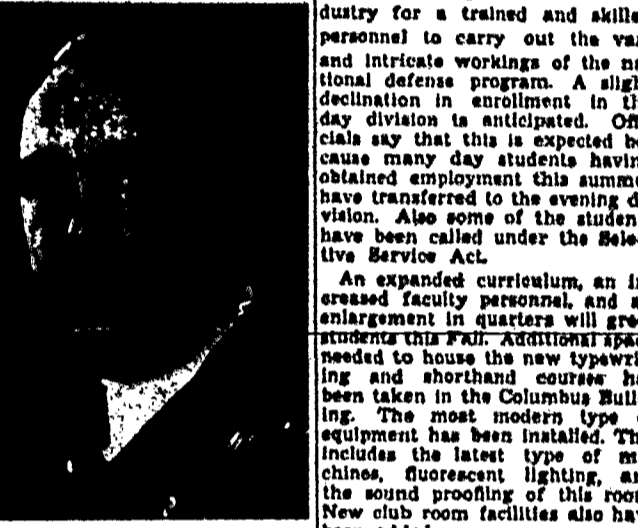

LONDON - The Catholic population of French Morocco has considerably increased to 172,000 out of a total of 6,400,000, announces Radio Vatican. Missionaries have increased from 28 to 87. The 89 centers of worship have increased to 160.

Q.) six microphones for use by the roving announcers and commentators, and two for apparatus needed to house the new typewriting and shorthand courses which have been taken in the Columbus Building. The most modern type of equipment has been installed. This includes the latest type of machines, fluorescent lighting, and sound proofing of this room. New club room facilities also have been added.

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Newspaper Drive Set Sept. 27 To Aid Work For Homeless

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Pierce has handled the engineering assignment on the "Doctor I. Q." program since it went on the air in April, 1939. During that time he has traveled back and forth each week from Chicago headquarters to the scene of the broadcast in 18 different cities. That bit of traveling adds up to more than three trips around the world, 86,200 miles. The only weeks he didn't commute back to Chicago were while the show was in Los Angeles, Miami and Seattle. Nor is Pierce's job confined to twisting control knobs. When "Doctor I. Q." moves from one city to another every day, Pierce is on the scene in the new city several days in advance to install about 600 pounds of equipment and some 2,000 feet of wire under the floor and through air-
