Charity Institute Sponsored By Elmira Women

Members of Elmira Ladies of Charity will sponsor a special institute for volunteer workers during the month of October. Meetings will be held on Tuesday of each week at 8 o'clock in the Federation Building.

Originally planned for members of the Friendly Visiting, Personal Service, Foster Home and Big Sister Committees, the Institute will draw a large attendance from other members of the organization.

This Institute, entitled "New Frontiers for the Volunteer," is dedicated to St. Louise de Marillac, co-foundress of the Ladies of Charity. Special effort will be made to bring home to members of the Ladies of Charity the possibility of attaining the heights of volunteer service that it may be said of them as of Louise de Marillac: "Here was a life spent in the world and yet without ever leaving it."

The first meeting which was held on Oct. 7 featured a presentation by the Rev. Hubert A. Blasky, Case Consultant of Catholic Charities. The subject was "The Catholic Volunteer in Social Work." Another feature on this program was Edward W. Austin, Executive Director of the Community Chest, who talked on "Our City and Our People."

At Oct. 14 meeting Miss Hazel L. Stewart, District Supervising Nurse, State Department of Health, will speak on "An Investment in Health." Dr. Ross Bigelow of the State Dept. of Mental Hygiene will discuss "Personality in the Making."

"What Shall the Volunteer Record?" will be the subject chosen by Mrs. Spill Donegan, Intake Supervisor of the Chemung County Department of Public Welfare, on Oct. 21. On the same evening the Rev. Thomas J. Toole, Reverend Moderator of the Ladies of Charity, will speak on the "The Vincentian Spirit."

At the closing meeting of the Institute on Oct. 28 the volunteer group will hear Antonio A. Sorrelli, Area Director, Department of Social Welfare, tell "Whom the Government Assists and Why." Closing presentation will be made by Mrs. T. Edmund Kelly, President of the Ladies of Charity. Her subject will be "Growing Pains of a Volunteer."

Mrs. Kelly, who spoke at the General Assembly of the Ladies of Charity in June, has been appointed President of the newly organized Buffalo branch of the Ladies of Charity.

Plans for the Institute were made by a committee headed by Mrs. George A. Snyder, President and Chairman of the Elmira Sister Council. Other members of her committee are Mrs. Joseph M. Daley, Chairman of the Foster Home Committee; Mrs. Walter T. Erwin, Chairman of the Personal Committee; Miss Mary E. Fitzgerald, Director of Catholic Charities, and Mrs. Frederick Praehel, in charge of the Friendly Visiting group.

Similar institutes are held each year by volunteer groups in various sections of the state. It is generally conceded that there is both strength and weakness in the very breadth which volunteer work covers. Social agencies, particularly in the Catholic field, are devoted to a grand social ideal. Social workers and volunteer workers in affiliation of a faith and a loyalty to that ideal. The entire program of the Ladies of Charity is based on the Vincentian Principle and it is at the request of members of the organization that the plan for this Institute has been made. It might be said that the Ladies of Charity who conscientiously accept their obligations will welcome this educational opportunity and in so doing will feel that they are placing the seal of St. Louise de Marillac on the record of their devotion which could well be labeled by the words of St. Paul used on the words of St. Louise, "The Charity of Christ Preaches Us."
