It was Ray Pierce's day to do his stuff. (See photo, this page.) After trailing the Corning outfit from the start, he was the hero of the game. Aquinas came back in the second half when Pierce shot a pass to the one-yard line on a 4-yard pass to Sorelli. A one-yard plunge by the same Sorelli led to the score. Pierce was replacing Bob Focott, speedy back, with a foot injury. The 16-year-old junior, weighing but 144 pounds and with slight frame, was a star at the start of the game.

Corning's Billy came on the third play when Jack Williams broke through tackles and raced 50 yards to score.

A comfort to Coach Sullivan is the brilliant line play of Bob Callahan, 16-year-old guard, whose tackling and blocking have been a source of strength for the Irish.
