

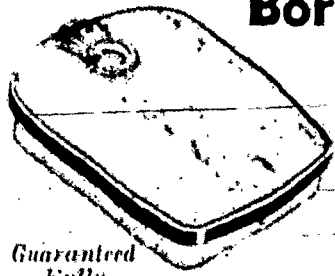

Final Tribute Paid Scottsville Pastor

at St. Patrick's Church Mumford (Text of Eulogy below)

Among the more than 100 members of the clergy who in attendance were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. James J. Hartley, P.A., the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William F. Bergin, Chancellor of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Abner J. Quinn of Camden, N. J., the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burke and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron.

Hearers were the Rev. Daniel H. O'Rourke, the Rev. John M. Selinger, the Rev. John J. Healy, the Rev. William J. Ayers, the Rev. John P. Callahan and the Rev. Harry Felski S.V.D.

A large number of parishioners and townspeople of Scottsville paid their respects to the pastor and attended the funeral services.

Ordained June 6, 1903, Father McArdle served as assistant pastor at Holy Family Church, Auburn, for nearly seven years. Appointed pastor of St. Mary's of the Assumption Church, in 1910, he ably administered the parish for the long span of 31 years and endeared himself to his parishioners.

Born in 1879, he was born in Rochester, June 2, 1879, and attended the old Cathedral Grammar School and St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary. He received his philosophical and theological training at St. Bernard's Seminary.

PASTOR DIES

Surviving the Scottsville pastor are his brother, the Rev. Edward McArdle, San Diego, Cal., and a sister, Miss Rose McArdle of Rochester.

Burial was in the family plot at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, where His Excellency, Bishop Kearney imparted the final absolution.

Vespers of the dead were chanted by priests of the diocese in St. Mary's of the Assumption Church on Sunday evening.

Text of Eulogy Delivered At Fr. McArdle Rites

In his eulogy of the late Rev. Patrick J. McArdle, pastor of St. Mary's of the Assumption Church, Scottsville at the Pontifical funeral services, Monday, the Rev. John M. Selling, r. said in part:

Thirty-eight years ago a Bishop of the Catholic Church sat before the High Altar of St. Patrick's Cathedral in Rochester. Before him upon the steps of the altar knelt Patrick McArdle. As he knelt there he felt the hands of the Bishop pressing upon his head and perhaps in his mind he had a picture of St. Peter or St. Paul or one of the other Apostles pressing his hands upon the heads of young men kneeling before him.

Then he saw the Bishop spread the Holy Chrism upon his outstretched hand and was told that what he blessed would be blessed and what he consecrated would be consecrated. Then into those hands were placed the golden paten and the Sacred Chalice, the instruments he would use in the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

To his ears came the words of the Bishop giving him power over the souls of men while into his own soul rushed the saving graces of the Sacrament of Holy Orders. At the end of the ceremony he arose a Priest of God an Ambassador of Christ. Another Christ.

Pastorate Begun
Thirty-one years ago Father McArdle appeared in this sanctuary and announced to the congregation that he had been assigned as their new pastor. He perhaps explained to you at that time his pleasure in being made your pastor and told of his plans for the future.

You accepted him as your pastor. You brought to him your babies, upon their heads he poured the saving waters of Baptism, cleansing them from Original Sin and making them Christians and children of God and heirs of heaven. You then taught them their simple prayers and explained to them the Christmas Crib and its story and the Stations of the Cross and what that meant.

As they grew in intelligence and age you brought the little ones to him and asked him to continue their instruction in Christian Doctrine. This task he cheerfully accepted and carried on to the end with the help of the good Sisters of Charity.

Often you knelt at his side and poured into his ear the story of your mistakes and sins, and received from him advice and absolution. Every Sunday you assembled in church to assist at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass which he celebrated for you. And often you knelt at the Communion rail to receive from his hand the Sacred Host uniting you to your God so that you became like the branch on the vine, receiving as the branch did from the vine, spiritual life, strength and nourishment from Jesus Christ. Highly Respected.

As a citizen of the community he was always greatly interested in everything which was for the betterment of the community. Frequently he would be stopped on the street or in public assembly and asked to give his advice on some question or matter of concern to the people of the village.

To them he always gave a kindly answer and if possible good advice which they sought. So for 31 years he labored long as pastor of this Church and as a citizen of this community. A few days ago an order was issued from Supreme Headquarters as follows:

Reverend Patrick J. McArdle, pastor of St. Mary's of the Assumption Church, Scottsville, N. Y. is hereby relieved from active duty and will report immediately to these headquarters for a review of his life.

The veil of secrecy is now drawn.

Today we are gathered here to pay respects to his mortal remains. To you, the members of his immediate family, the members of the congregation, to his fellow citizens of Scottsville, we as Bishop and his fellow priests extend our sincere sympathy in your sorrow and we invite you to join in prayer with us that his soul may have eternal rest and that perpetual light may shine upon him. May he rest in peace!
