The Society for the Propagation of the Faith

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Thirteen years ago there were only 50 Christians in the district and now there are well over 3,000. The new church is being built to hold 2,000 people at one time. Spiritually, the parish grows rapidly. The missionaries serve 20,000 Holy Communion a month and more than one hundred children are baptized every year.

There is a great need however for funds to carry on this great work. Father L. Jacobs of St. Joseph's Foreign Mission Society, who opened the station in 1927 writes: "Must we send catechumens away because we have no money to pay catechists? Must the school teachers go because we have no money to pay them? Actually everyone in the world is called upon to be a missionary even though the privilege of working in the field is reserved for a limited few. We in Nyimkom are trying to do our part and we will succeed if American Catholics help us."

Mission News Briefs

WUPING, China The Prefecture of Tingchow, in which Wuping is located, promises bright hopes for the future in spiritual matters but little in the way of material comfort, judging from the following statement just received from Msgr. Egbert Pelzer.
"I have been forced to prohibit the use of any but the barest necessities in every one of my mission stations since we have only enough to keep body and soul together for two months more. After that only God knows what will happen to us!"

KUMBakonah, India—There is a large leper hospital located in this busy city, and according to the superiors, Mother Xavier-Joseph, the number of in-patients increases daily. However these new arrivals create added problems for the good religious. "The non-importation of rice from Burma and Indo-China," writes Mother Xavier-Joseph, "has created a shortage which has sent prices skyrocketing just as the added number of patients necessitates much larger purchases of this great essential of the Indian diet."
