### Father Kelley To Address Opening of Labor College

The Rev. William J. Kelley, O. M. I., Educational Director of the Ives Legislation Committee on Industrial and Labor Conditions, will address the inaugural session of the Catholic Labor College on Friday evening at 8 o'clock at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 402 South Avenue. Father Kelley spoke in Rochester last spring at the public forum on industrial relations at Catherine Strong Hall.

The Rev. George V. Vogt, M.A., Director of the Labor College and diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, asks all those interested in attending the classes and engaging in the discussions of the Labor College, to enroll at the conclusion of Father Kelley's address.

Classes and discussions begin next week, and every Friday evening henceforward at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality. Father Vogt will teach the class in Labor Ethics, using as his text the first booklet in Father Virgil Michel's series on The Social Question; the first half of Father's class will be devoted to an explanation of the text and the last half to an informal discussion from the floor of the text.

Doctor Aaron I. Abell, Ph. D., head of the History Department of Nazareth College will lecture on American Labor History bringing the history of American Labor up to date.

Father Vogt extends a cordial invitation to everyone concerned in the rights, duties and problems of labor and industry to come and hear Father Kelley's address and to register for the Labor College.
