

Football**Aquinas Blanks CBA 7 to 0**

Aquinas Institutes grid team will attempt to retain its unbeaten status this week when the Canisius High School eleven of Buffalo comes to town for the annual game with the DeSales Avenue Squad. The only "tight" spot on the Aquinas record is a 6-6 tie with Cornelia Free Academy.

Castling in on the deadly punting of little Hobbs Pickett, Aquinas scored a last minute touchdown to defeat a favored C.B.A. eleven 7 to 0 last Saturday on the Edgerton Park gridiron.

A sloppy field and a driving rain forced both teams to resort to a punting duel with Pickett doing the kicking for the local team while Phil Parsons did the booting for the Syracuse eleven.

Both Parsons and Pickett waged an even duel until the last five minutes of play when one of Pickett's punts rolled dead on the C.B.A. two-yard line. Parsons kicked from his end zone to the Aquinas 38 but Pickett came back right back and dropped another punt out of bounds on the C.B.A. 4. Parsons return boot landed on the Aquinas 21 and with only one minute left to play Aquinas opened up with a passing attack. Two passes from Ray Pierce to Paul Gilligan netted 20 yards to the C.B.A. 8-yard line. Borrelli picked up 4 on a plunge. Jim Smith then passed to Paul Gilligan on the goal line for the touchdown, with the clock showing only 8 seconds to go. Pierce passed to Frank Ammering for the conversion.

Aquinas held a slight edge in line play over the Syracuse eleven with Ammering and Callahan doing a masterful job. On the offensive Pickett, Pierce, Smith, Borrelli and Gilligan stood out for Aquinas while Parsons, Phil Britt and Tom Raciti starred for the visitors.
