

Football Aquinas Blanks CBA 7 to 0

Aquinas Institute's grid team will attempt to retain its unbeaten status this week when the Aquinas High School eleven of Buffalo comes to town for the annual game with the DeWitt Avenue Squad. The only slight hitch on the Aquinas record is a 6-6 tie with Corning Free Academy.

Clanking in on the deadly punting of little Hubbs Pickett Aquinas scored a last minute touchdown to defeat favored CBA 7 to 0 last Saturday on the Edgerton Park gridiron.

A sloppy job and a driving rain forced both teams to resort to a punting duel with Pickett among the kicking for the local team while Phil Parsons did the booting for the Syracuse eleven.

Both Parsons and Pickett waged an every duel until the last five minutes of play when one of Pickett's punts rolled dead on the CBA two-yard line. Parsons kicked from his end zone to the Aquinas 58 but Pickett came back right back and dropped another punt out of bounds on the CBA 4. Parsons return boot landed on the Aquinas 71 and with only one minute left to play Aquinas opened up with a passing attack. Two passes from Ray Pierce to Paul Gilligan netted 20 yards to the CBA 8-yard line. Borrelli picked up 4 on a plunge. Jim Smith then passed to Paul Gilligan on the goal line for the touchdown with the clock showing only 8 seconds to play. Pierce passed to Frank Ammering for the conversion.

Aquinas held a slight edge in line play over the Syracuse eleven with Ammering and Callahan doing a masterful job. On the offensive Pickett, Pierce, Smith, Borrelli and Gilligan stood out for Aquinas while Parsons, Phil Britt and Tom Racchetti starred for the visitors.

he tried for an acting career on Broadway without setting the street on fire. Next, as radio night club announcer Van's unique delivery attracted the attention of a director of the then fledgling "March of Time".

Wistful Vita's Myrt has become so familiar to radio audiences that when you pick up the phone in New York or Tampa you half way expect her to cut in on your conversation.

But Myrt is only a myth a frequent interruption from the

Wistful Vita telephone company when Fibber McGee is putting in a call. Myrt's voice is heard only by Fibber never over the air, yet she's known almost as well as the loquacious Fibber himself. She is one of radio's favorite "unheard" characters.

The Fibber McGee and Molly show has another "unheard" character, Mr. Wallace Wimpie, whose rise in popularity coincides with that of her husband, a comparatively new creation of young man-tooled Bill Thompson. Mr. Wimpie is an exaggerated exemplification of the henpecked husband and from his comments you get a perfect picture of his belittling spouse. Uncle Dennis, Molly's irresponsible uncle is another "unheard" character who contributes many spots of humor to the McGee show.

George Jessel's mother has been an established stage character for many years. Her O'Casey hostess of Penthouse Party makes many references to her mother too during the course of her weekly NBC broadcasts. Portland Hoffa and Mary Livingston use their mother for dialogic hits with Fred and Jack and of course, there is always George Allen's brother Willie and the rest of her wacky relatives to bear out the fact that it's the little men and women who aren't really there who makes the major network comedy shows comical indeed.
