POPE'S VIEWS QUOTED IN NEW N.C.W.C. PAMPHLET

WASHINGTON—Excerpts from Pope Pius XII's address on citizen ship compose the fifth pamphlet in the Christian Democracy Series of brochures issued by the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The pamphlet, entitled "The Pope and Christian Citizenship" was compiled by the Rev. Francis J. Boland, C.S.C., of Notre Dame University, and includes passages from the Encyclical Letters of the Popes beginning with Pope Leo XIII on such subjects as the origin of political authority; the purpose of the State; the rights of the family; the duties and rights of citizens; education; the forms of government; and the relations of Church and State.

The West Nerts and the West Hematite are the first vessels flying the flag of Ireland to sail from New Orleans. They are the last of more than 40 freight ships, known as the "ghost fleet," that were built for the United States in the World War and had been anchored at Nine Mile Point in the Mississippi River above New Orleans.

Formal transfer under charter of the West Nerts and the West Hematite was announced by the United States Maritime Commission only two days before the vessels sailed. The crews of the two boats came to the United States from Ireland six weeks ago as passengers to take the boats to their homeland.

On the program with Monsignor Sheen were His Excellency the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, Dr. John F. Lynch, president of Elmira Catholic Charities Board and Miss Mary E. Fitzgerald, executive secretary of Catholic Charities.

The Bishop extolled Monsignor Sheen's use of logic and reason in approaching a controversial subject, declaring that the world's greatest need was more minds of his caliber.

Workers Make Sacrifice

His Excellency praised the functions of Community Chest agencies. He said that both the professional welfare workers and those who perform social charities are an avocation sacrifice more in time and effort than they can expect to receive in material things.

Bishop Kearney reminded his listeners of Christ's promise of the perpetual presence of the poor and in speaking for the underprivileged, concluded by saying "God bless you."

That His Excellency had flown and motored here from Salt Lake City, where he took part in the Golden Jubilee of that diocese to attend the dinner was brought out by Miss Fitzgerald in her remarks.

The executive secretary expressed deep gratitude to all those who made possible the operation of Catholic Charities during its 12-year existence here.

She reported that aid was extended to 1,900 members of 400 families during the last year. Most of this help, she pointed out, was other than material, and those seeking it were, in the majority, not regular recipients of aid.
