

### Prison Bakery Keeper Paid Final Tribute

Valentiz Barthelman prominent American and long-time bakery keeper at Auburn State Prison died Monday Oct 13 1941 at his home in Chapel Street, Auburn.

Mr Barthelman coming to this country as a boy from Germany settled in Rochester where he engaged in the bakery and confectionery business. While an inhabitant of Rochester Mr Barthelman served as treasurer of the Rochester Trades Council and secretary of the Rochester Bakers Union, as well as being an active member of many musical groups in that city.

Mr Barthelman was appointed a bakery keeper at Auburn Prison in December, 1904, and served in that capacity until his late illness. As a resident of Auburn he was treasurer of the Auburn Trades Council and was secretary of the Auburn Bakers Union. During the World War Mr Barthelman was a member of the National Home Defense Council.

The funeral on Thursday morning Oct 16 1941, was at 8:30 from the family home in Chapel Street, and 9:00 from St. Alphonsus Church. A requiem Mass was sung by Rev. Gerald Gefell, with the pastor Rev. Frederick G. Straub, and assistant pastor Rev. Walter Fischer in the sanctuary. Present with the services at the house which were conducted by Father Straub and at the church, was a detachment of guards from Auburn Prison headed by Warden Joseph H. Brophy. Burial was in St. Joseph's Cemetery.

Honorary bearers were Sergt. Chris L. Johnston and Guards Raymond L. Hunter, Thomas Lawler, James Fedigan, Raymond Lewis, Charles Geraghty and Fred Rice.

Active bearers were Sergt. James P. McDonald, Guards Harold E. Harrington, John E. McCrane, Edward Ryan and James Voorhees and Kitchen Keeper Glenn, Yau Roper.

Besides his wife, Julia Miller Barthelman, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. George King, Mrs. Emily Barthelman and Mrs. James J. Binks; five grandchildren and seven nieces and nephews.
