Ticket booths have been distributed in the parish. Additional tickets may be obtained at the rectory.

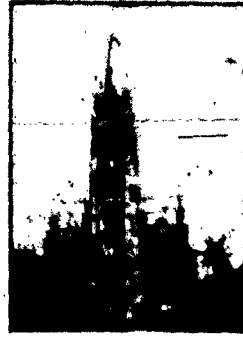
