Grade 1 and 2 wish to ransom a colored baby girl named Margaret Mary, Grade 3 and 4 would also like a colored baby named Joseph Anthony, Grade 5 and 6 choose a Mexican boy named Peter Joseph in honor of our new assistant, and Grade 7 and 8 want a colored girl named Josephine Marie. We are fully aware of the importance of our cooperation in mission activities and therefore offer what we can for the glory of our Lady of the Missions and Christ the King."

Aquinas Faces Elmira High

Aquinas Institute and Elmira High School meet this Saturday afternoon at Parker Field. Both teams have been pointing for this game and Art Hirst is ready to field the same team which played in the Jamestown contest. All are in good condition and ready for the Irish of Rochester.

Aquinas is in top form after its 24-11 verdict over the highly touted Canisius High team of Buffalo. Canisius had piled up 70 points in two games and never had its goal line crossed. Aquinas had no respect for the record of the Buffalonians as Bill Reynolds took personal charge and scored three times.

This victory was the fourth in five games for the Aquinas eleven. Morning Free Academy earned a tie with them for the only blot on the Irish record.

Aquinas has been hampered by injuries all season. Carl Borrelli suffered a hip injury last week and will be out of action for some time. Bob Pockett has just returned to active duty after being out with an arch injury. His presence in the lineup Saturday will help the chances of the Irish against the strong Elmiraans.

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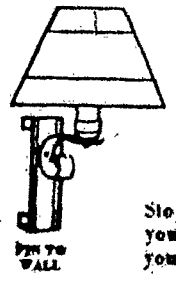
