The card party held on Wednesday afternoon at Edwards Auditorium under the auspices of the Rochester Diocesan Council, N. C. W., for the benefit of the National Catholic School of Social Service in Washington, was most successful. A detailed report will be given in next week's CATHOLIC COURIER.

As you know, the School is the project confided to our Catholic women by the Bishops of the country. A letter received at our office from one of the students at the School tells us "There are 42 in the first year classes. They come from as far away as Brazil, Puerto Rico, Hawaii and Columbia. Many improvements have been made this year; the auditorium has been redecorated and the library has new equipment."

In accordance with the Governor's proclamation that the last two weeks in November shall be devoted to state-wide emphasis on nutrition, the Committee on Better Nutrition for National Defense for Rochester and Monroe County, acting with the sanction of the Local Defense Council, are planning a five-day intensive program on nutrition and health, beginning at 1:00 P. M. Saturday, Nov. 13, and ending at 10:00 P. M. on Wednesday, Nov. 19, in the Civics Exhibit Building at the corner of Main and Fitzhugh Streets.

Following in logical sequence, there will be a series of exhibits telling the story of the "whys" and "hows" of better nutrition as a means to health. There will be a continuous showing of movies depicting health in its various aspects. Every afternoon there will be a demonstration of the "ways and means" of preparing appetizing food and lastly, in the evening,

there will be in addition to the exhibits and movies, both music and a speaker—well worth coming to hear.

Attaining better nutrition for national defense is a job which involves each and every one of us. It is our duty to strive to improve poor health and to make better good health—and to begin now!
