Holy Name Society

The annual membership campaign of Senior Division Holy Name Society will be conducted during the month of November. Leo J. Hourihan will serve as general chairman of the campaign. He will be assisted by the present officers of the Society: President, Major Claude E. Graves, Vice-president, Mr. Hourihan, Secretary, Lawrence E. Riley, Treasurer, Peter W. Shields. Other members of the Society will be designated later.

The Junior-Division of the Holy Name Society is sponsoring a series of social evenings for the girls and boys of high school age in the parish. The first of the series was held on Oct. 26 in the assembly hall of St. Patrick's School and was attended by the seniors, juniors and sophomores of the Elmira Catholic High School and the Elmira Academy, who attend St. Patrick's parish.

The next party will be held on Monday evening, Nov. 10, the eve of Armistice Day. Featured on the program will be patriotic speeches, songs and dances. Only members of the freshman class at both high schools will be invited to this party especially arranged for them.

Music for singing and dancing will be furnished by "The MCH-oes" the school orchestra of Elmira Catholic High School.

Lectures On Lepers

The story of Third Franciscan Order of Syracuse in America, Molokai and beyond was narrated by Sister Mary Claire, O.S.F., of the Community. She is the former Car-

olyn Roth Doran of Elmira. Rev. Francis Pegnam, moderator of St. Patrick's Sodality, introduced the speaker, Sister Mary Claire, who was the first president of the Sodality.

Sister Mary Tarcista, principal of the Franciscan Convent School of Syracuse, assisted Sister Mary Claire.

About 500 people heard of the wonderful work being done in Molokai among the lepers.

With the aid of slides, the speaker traced the history of the Order from its origin in 1851. The work among the lepers was begun when priests of the Order of the Sacred Heart solicited their aid. Mother Mary Ann, in charge of the convent at Syracuse, volunteered her services and spent 35 years working in the leper colony.

"An inspiring display of faith was shown me when I attended my first Mass at the leper colony of Molokai," Sister Mary Claire said. "To the altar railing came victims of the dreaded disease, whose bodies were eaten away so badly that they could hardly walk, to receive Our Lord in Holy Communion. The organ was played by two lepers one whose hands were eaten away and the other having lost her feet. Between them they played and the music was beautiful."

Funeral Service

Funeral services for Matthew T. Kane were held Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. Rev. William J. Braen, pastor of St. Patrick's parish was celebrant of the Mass.

A heart attack proved fatal to Mr. Kane while he was attending the 9 o'clock Mass last Sunday.

Mr. Kane was a well known resident of Elmira and well-liked throughout the city. He had been a blacksmith for many years and retired a few years ago. Hence the death of his sister a year ago, Mr. Kane has been a daily attendant at Mass. In winter, when the weather kept less hardy people indoors, he would be seen trudging on to Mass sometimes in the street when the snow was too deep or sidewalks too slippery.

Mr. Kane's passing will be deeply mourned in Elmira by his numerous friends. He was a highly respected citizen, an outstanding Catholic and a friend to many.

Surviving are two nephews, John J. and Francis J. O'Brien of Corning and several cousins in Elmira, Rochester and Scranton.
