Josephin Peltola and the music of Brahms was like a gypsy woman dancing in corsets. Philip Hale found sensuous Platonic in the core of Brahms. There is in Brahms the orchestration of Nature and the heroism of poets (October and Sonnet 152 of Shakespeare more than they performed helped me to understand the Third. What a pity quantity is here given at the expense of quality. If any piece made a bit it was not the most poetic of Brahms symphonies but the percussive feat of the Gould Symphonies. While the Third is the shortest of the four symphonies it is as Tovey points out the most romantic. Its difficulties of rhythm, phrasing and tone can only be solved with the leisure of leaves coloring in the fall.

Brahms like Bach builds orderly as grain is sowed in sunset fields. The opening three movements have the heroic banners wave above the ornate hills of his vision. The violas of Brahms forever leave the earth to give us the stars. Brahms writes before light.
