## Labor College Talks Listed

The Rochester Catholic Labor College held its third class and discussion on Friday evening at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 402 South Avenue.

Dr. Aaron I. Abell, Ph.D., head of the History Department of Nazareth College, continued his series of lectures on American Labor History. He described the difficulties experienced by trade unions in their fight to have their natural rights of free association and collective bargaining recognized. He declared that the courts recognized the validity of "yellow-dog" contracts until 1912. Such contracts are now invalid under the National Labor Relations Act. Dr. Abell's talk provoked a long and lively discussion on the evils of the "yellow dog" contracts and the exploitation they made possible.

Milton J. Fess, of the Catholic Worker Group was the chairman for the discussion next week's chairman will be William J. Eucher, president of the Catholic Central Verein Rochester Branch.

The Rev. Geo. C. Vogt, diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and director of the Labor College, continued his series of talks on human rights. He is using as a text the booklet entitled Human Rights in Father Virgil Muehl's series on The Social Question. He discussed the respective rights and duties of society and the individual and invited discussion at each point in the talk.

Dr. Abell and Father Vogt will resume their talks and preside at the subsequent discussions on next Friday evening at 8:00 o'clock at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 402 South Avenue.

## STAMP GUILD AIDS PANAMA BISHOP

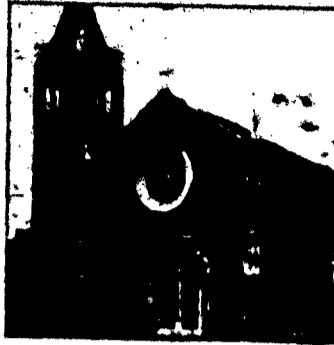
