Funeral services were held at 9 o'clock from St. Mary's Church, where Rev. Dennis W. Hickey was the celebrant of the Requiem High Mass. Burial was at Union Springs cemetery, where a firing

squad and bugler from the Union Springs Post of the American Legion conducted military honors. Father Hickey, officiated at the committal, assisted by Rev. John H. Neary of Aurora.
