Dedication of the new pipe organ in St. Stanislaus Church, Hudson Ave., Rochester, will take place on Thursday evening, Nov. 27, at 8 P.M. with His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D. officiating.

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more or less program has been arranged to follow the blessing ceremony.

Organ solos will be played by Philip G. Krekel, noted organist of the diocese. St. Stanislaus Church, under the patronage of St. Stanislaus, will be heard in choral selections directed by Father J. Biagioli, director.

A sermon for the occasion will be presented by Bishop Kearney. This will be followed by another group of numbers on the organ, played by Mr. Krekel, and selected by the St. Stanislaus choir.

The organ, which was constructed by the Tellers Organ Company of Erie, Pa., is said to be the finest and largest organ installed in any Catholic Church in Rochester during the last quarter of a century.

Cornerstone Laying Set At St. Mary's Hospital

With His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D. officiating, the ceremony of cornerstone laying at the new St. Mary's Hospital will take place on Thursday, Nov. 27 at 4 p.m.

Priests of the diocese, Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, members of the principal members of the Board of Directors, nurses and organizations affiliated with the hospital will participate.

The public is invited. Sister Mary, superintendent of the hospital announced today.

The cornerstone containing historical documents of the 84-year-old institution which has achieved a remarkable record in the care of the sick and injured of this community will be placed in the front entrance facade facing on Geneva Street.

Progress on the building ground for which was broken by Bishop Kearney on May 28, is ahead of schedule. Joseph P. Flynn, architect states. The entire structure is now completed. The outer or back wall is completed around the perimeter of the building to the second floor.

Construction of the building which is to cost \$1,000,000 is being conducted in spite of a lack of materials. Funds are coming through and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

When completed St. Mary's Hospital will be one of the best designed and equipped medical and convalescent institutions in the country and will be a credit to the community. The cornerstone laying will be followed by a service.

Link Religion With Patriotism

NEW ORLEANS. Religion and patriotism must be linked or little but change is to be expected," the Most Rev. Joseph F. Dummett, Archbishop of New Orleans, said at the convention here of the Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women, for which the theme was "Religion and Patriotism."

It is said that religion is on trial. His Excellency said: "Religion is not on trial, because there can be no trial for what comes from God, but the people are on trial, to see how true they are to their faith. The undermining of Christianity in daily life is more serious than physical warfare. We must become more active and militant in asserting our faith and more militant in the practice of it."

'Crisis' Reviewed By Over 100 Prelates

WASHINGTON (NC) — Nazism and Communism were termed "subversive forces, both in control of powerful governments, both bent on world dominance" in a statement on "The Crisis of Christianity" issued Sunday by the Administrative Board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

This statement was drafted to make the declaration as an expression of the purpose of the Bishops of the United States totaling 111 members of the American Hierarchy who concluded their Annual Meeting here Friday. This was the largest number of the Bishops of the United States in history to assemble at the Annual Meeting.

Neither system Nazism or Communism, the statement declared, understands or permits freedom or true Christian service.

Noting that the late Pope Pius XI signed in 1937, issued his Encyclical on Nazism and atheism, minimum within five days of his letter the statement required that while condemning both systems that Pontiff expressed his love for the German people and sympathy for their suffering, and asserted that it was not part of his intention to condemn the peoples of the Soviet Union in mass, recognizing that "not a few of them, grain beneath the yoke imposed on them by men who in very large part are strangers to the real interests of their country."

The Bishops pledged wholehearted support of the adequate defense of our country.

The prelate called for exemplary restraint in saying:

"In this solemn hour when fatal decisions are to be made it is evident that a spirit of exemplary restraint should characterize our priests and people. In every national crisis and every danger our priests have been an inspiration. We are confident that their good example of strong faith and courage founded on the virtue of fortitude.

Bishop Kearney Named To Home Mission Board

WASHINGTON — The Most Rev. John A. Flores, Archbishop of Louisville; the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, and the Most Rev. Joseph E. Ritter, Bishop of Indianapolis, were elected new members of the American Board of Catholic Missions at the Bishops' Annual Meeting here.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney's election came in recognition of his continued interest in the Salt Lake Diocese and in other important home mission projects.

Highlights At Bishops' Annual Meeting

WASHINGTON (NC) — Under leadership of their Bishops, scholars of the United States are to celebrate next year the twenty-fifth anniversary of the episcopal installation of His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

Plans are being made following the Annual General Meeting of the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States just held at the Catholic University of America here. His Eminence Dennis Cardinal Dougherty, Archbishop of Philadelphia, was presided over the meeting appointed the Archbishops Metropolitan of the United States a special committee to plan the celebration.

Pope's Gratitude Expressed For Aid

WASHINGTON (NC) — His Holiness Pope Pius XII sent to the Hierarchy priests and faithful of the United States special testimony to his gratitude for the upholding of his hands in his paternal efforts to bring relief to suffering peoples throughout the world.

Gratefully acknowledging the Sovereign Pontiff's message, the Archbishops and Bishops reaffirmed their "profound desire to support the Holy See in carrying on its mission of apostolic charity in war-torn countries."

Making an extraordinary appearance before the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States as they opened their Annual General Meeting His Excellency the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, read a cablegram signed by Pope Pius XII conveying his "special Apostolic Benediction to the Catholics of this country as a pledge of copious heavenly favors."

Archbishop Mooney Renamed Chairman

WASHINGTON (NC) — Members of the Hierarchy elected by the Annual General Meeting of the Bishops this week to constitute the Administrative Board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference for the coming year met at the N.C.W.C. headquarters and organized.

The Most Rev. Edward Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, was elected Chairman of the new Administrative Board. Archbishop Mooney also served as chairman last year.
