ing most of his time to the unfolding of a plot. In contemporary literature and art we have a loss of a sense of values. There is brutality and cynicism an immersion of decent reactions. The answer to the chaos of thought can be found in the treasures of Christ where there are reserves by which the pseudo-thinkers of today can be truly met.

"If the world is to be saved the intellectual newspaper writers, beginning with those in our own country, must be taught as little children that the physical ups and downs of life have nothing to do with attaining to spiritual heights" was the concluding remark made by the lecturer.

Mr. Noyes was asked to repeat some of his poems for the audience. In complying with this request, Mr. Noyes recited "The Highwayman" and poems from "The Torchbearers and Shadows on the Down".

In the question and answer period which followed, this poet-thinker from England was asked to compare writings of Welles and Chesterton. He replied that one was a midget, concerned only with material things; while the other, Chesterton, was a giant, "a man who put first things first."
