### New Organ Dedication Set Nov. 27

Dedication of the new pipe organ in St. Stanislaus Church, Hudson Ave., Rochester, will take place on Thursday evening, Nov. 27, at 8 P. M. with His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D. officiating.

Under the direction of the Rev. Joseph A. Baker, pastor, a musical program has been arranged to follow the blessing ceremony.

Organ solos will be played by Philip G. Kreckel, organist of the diocese St. Stanislaus Church Choir under the patronage of St. Cecilia will be heard in choral selections directed by Miss J. Bogasni, Director.

A sermon for the occasion will be preached by Bishop Kearney which will be followed by another group of numbers on the organ played by Mr. Kreckel and selections by the St. Stanislaus choir.

The organ, which was constructed by the Tellers Organ Company of Erie, Pa., is said to be "the finest and largest organ installed in any Catholic Church in Rochester during the last quarter of a century."

### 'Crisis' Reviewed By Over 100 Prelates

WASHINGTON (N. C.)—Nazism and Communism were termed "subversive forces; both bent on world domination" in a statement on "The Crisis of Christianity" issued Sunday by the Administrative Board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

This statement was debated to make the declaration an expression of the minds of the Bishops of the United States totaling 111 members of the American Hierarchy who concluded their Annual Meeting here Friday. This was the largest number of the Bishops of the United States in history to assemble at the Annual Meeting.

Complete text of the Bishop's Statement on "The Crisis of Christianity" is on Page 3 this issue.

Neither system Nazism or Communism the statement declared understood or permits freedom in its true Christian sense.

Noting that the late Pope Pius XI significantly issued his Encyclicals on Nazism and atheistic Communism within five days of each other, the statement reminded that while condemning both systems that Pontiff expressed his love for the German people, and his sympathy for their sufferings, and asserted that it was not part of his intention to condemn the peoples of that nation.

The Bishops pledged wholehearted support of "the adequate defense of our country."

The prelates called for "exemplary restraint" by saying "In this solemn hour when (so) many decisions are to be made it is evident that a spirit of exemplary restraint should characterize our priests and people in every national crisis and every danger our priests have been an inspiration. We are confident that these good examples of strong faith and courage founded on the virtues of for-
