Cites Maryknoll Co-Founder

NEW YORK Renowned as the co-founder of America's first missionary society Bishop James Anthony Walsh of Maryknoll is the subject of Daniel Sargent's latest book, "All the Day Long."

Bishop Walsh was a Cambridge-born priest with a consciousness of the world church and her needs which seemed to have grown with him from his boyhood days when he went diligently on his neighborhood rounds collecting pennies for the Holy Childhood. During seminary days his Sulpician professors personalized his interest by sharing with him memories of Blessed Theophane Venard, Tonkin martyr, and others who were in the front lines of the Church's mission forces.

After ordination, Father Walsh was appointed Director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith in the Boston Archdiocese. In 1907 *The Field Afar*, a mission magazine was born and destined to prepare the way for a national seminary for the training of foreign missionaries.

At the International Eucharistic Congress in Montreal, Father Walsh met Father Price, a missionary from North Carolina, and discovered that they saw the same need and believed in the same solution. Their plan was placed before the Hierarchy of the United States, which appointed them to found the seminary of their dreams.

Pioneering days at Hawthorne, N. Y., had the thrill of hardships which was kept wholesome by Father Walsh's charming humor.

Maryknoll then moved to its permanent site near Ossining, N. Y.

Today, the Maryknoll family numbers 295 priests, 90 Brothers, 292 students and 600 Sisters laboring for souls in China, Japan, Korea, Manchukuo, the Philippine and Hawaiian Islands, and along the Pacific Coast in our own country.

Scottish, English Bishops To Discuss Drafting Of Clergy For Fire Watching

LONDON The Scottish Hierarchy will discuss the question of the conscription of priests for fire watching at an early meeting.

The Bishops of the Westminster Province are meeting soon and it is likely that they, too, will give their attention to the matter.

The entire man power of the country has been registered for the duty of watching for outbreaks of fire. Every building is being guarded in this way, and the only exemptions so far granted from compulsory watching are in favor of members of the various defense forces and doctors.

It is argued that priests are badly needed for spiritual ministrations during air raids and that they would be prevented from carrying out their work if they were compelled by law to be fighting fires. It would be an offense against the law, under existing arrangements, for a priest to leave his fire-fighting post to administer the Last Sacraments.

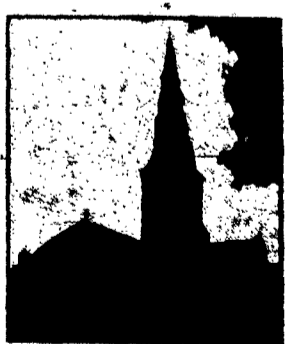
