"Birth of the Blues" a superior picture of its type. Crosby, Mary Martin and others do a lot with such familiar numbers as "Walt Until the Sun Shines Nellie," "Cuddle Up a Little Closer," "Melancholy Baby," "Memphis Blues," "By the Light of the Silvery Moon," and others, including a new novelty, "Walter, Porter, Upstairs Maid." But the standout song sequence is an electric moment is the singing by Ruby Elzy of "St. Louis Blues," as it has never been sung before in the straight portion of the picture. Crosby, Miss Martin and Brian Donnelly all do well, although little Crosby Lee is obviously dragged in just for the sake of a few on-screen rhymes. She's cute but painfully self-conscious. But for audacious who like this type of picture. Both of the Blues has just about everything you want.

"Shadow of the Thin Man" — A-2

One of the things about the first "Thin Man" picture that endeared it to movie audiences, was the unobtrusive emphasis which characterized Nick and Nora, the detectives. Now, in "The Shadow of the Thin Man" the fourth of the series, Nick and Nora are still carrying on, but not with the carefree ease that once was theirs. It seems to us that they are going at this tumbling a little grimly — "get a laugh or bust." Slapstick has forced its ugly head. They seem not so much like the Nick and Nora of old as like a sophisticated Blondie and Dagwood!

The mystery this time is not particularly holding, principally because even the most rank amateur detective would have little difficulty in picking the culprit. They go to such lengths to avoid casting the shadow of suspicion on the real murderers that anyone can pick the criminal before the picture is half over. Nevertheless, it is pleasant enough as all the "Thin Man" pictures have been and William Powell and Myrna Loy are still in there pulling the repartee. Sam Lovene, Alan Baxter and Lou Lubin stand out in the supporting cast, while a

Stores Seek More Holiday Workers

For the first time in a great many years Rochester manufacturers and business concerns are faced with the possibility of a shortage of qualified workers. This is stated by Sumner H. Forward, Director, New York State Employment Service in a letter received by His Excellency Bishop Kearney.

Temporary and part time work is now available to a large number during the period from Thanksgiving to Christmas. Mr. Forward announced:

"We appeal to everyone who has a Sales Personality and can sell to contact our office as soon as possible relative to holiday work. The status 'Married women who have selling experience or ability may enjoy the opportunity to add to their family income in order to offset the Christmas budgets and contribute to the rise in living costs.'"


Those who have completed their school work during the past year and are not now employed are urged to contact the New York State Employment Service at Buffalo relative to a number of possible employment opportunities.

Discussing the shortage of workers Mr. Forward stated that agencies have already developed in a number of occupations and industries, with the result that workers with less skills have been moved into, while others are being employed and trained to take their places.


"Some employees of non-defense concerns are at the same time moving to defense industries. Trading is therefore brisk on the Labor Market."
