### Auburn Paper Commends Youthful Cast in St. Mary's 'Playtime'

AUBURN — "Playtime of 1941" the annual entertainment by the children of St. Mary's School was presented last evening in Lyceum Hall before a capacity audience and will be given again this evening at 8 o'clock. The true patriotic spirit of America, the deep religious fervor of the children in their dramas and the beautiful rendition of the songs showed the hours spent in perfecting this annual entertainment.

The First Grade in all the simplicity of childhood bragged about the tracks and goodness of their dolly when he was a boy. Their enthusiasm was great and the audience fully appreciated their first presentation to the public. The Second Graders gave a beautiful dramatization of the "Rosary." The history of the rosary which was given to St. Dominic by our Blessed Lady was explained by two pupils of the class in clear and concise language. The meaning of the Joyful Mysteries was told by a little girl dressed in white representing an angel while some of her classmates held a large white rosary.

The Sorrowful Mysteries were explained in the same way but the beads of the rosary were red in color. The Glorious Mysteries were represented likewise with yellow beads for the rosary. The class sang "Hail, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary." This entire dramatization was beautifully done and clearly explained although the children were mere youngsters. A large sign "Special Rates on Mother Goose and Fairyland Express" was carried by the Third Grade pupils. This number was representative of several nations. The little Japanese girls with their umbrellas and fans, symbolic of cherry blossom land, the gypsies from far off Spain who offered to tell fortunes and the little Dutch Girls as Dutch as they could be all united to make this story of immigrants a very likable and pleasing entertainment.

One of the shortest but most pleasing numbers was the Dutch Dance by the Fifth Grade. Dressed in patriotic costumes of red, white and blue and wearing wooden shoes the children tapped and slipped their way in perfect time to the music to win the universal applause of the audience. Dressed in blue with Little Boy Blue ready for his trundle bed the Fourth Grade pupils appeared to dramatize by words and music the immortal poem "Little Boy Blue." The Indians in all their silence came to enact the Indian Dance concluding it with a real Indian yell. Their costumes were very appropriate and their acting seemed very characteristic of Indian life. The Sixth and Eighth Grades presented "Medley of Songs" to which the audience listened with great appreciation because of the pleasing way in which the songs were rendered. The Seventh Grade dramatized "The History of Our Flag."

The play opened with the landing of Christopher Columbus on American shores, recalled the English and French settlements in America explained the making of the first flag by Betsy Ross and presented the story of George Washington. A pantomime of the flag representative of the one made by Betsy Ross with the 13 stars for the 13 colonies was given, and the final scene was the flag of Our Nation as it is today.
