

Indians Are Winners of Touch-Football Championship of St. Anthony's School

Alumnae Girls Defeat School Girls in Hockey

A large crowd witnessed the Third Annual Sports Day events, Thanksgiving morning on the St. Anthony's School Playground.

The activities started with the annual outdoor hockey game between the St. Anthony's School graduates and the school girls of the seventh and eighth grade, followed by the classic touch-football game between the Indians, winners of the first round, and the Wolves, winners of the second round of the School League.

Alumnae Girls Win, 3-2

The Alumnae girls, outwitted by their opponents, defeated the school girls, 3-2, in a hard fought game in the opening minutes of play Josephine Maffie of the Alumnae scored a perfect goal from a throw-in. A few minutes later Philomena Lacy of the School girls also scored a goal. The game was fought very hard the first half as both teams tried hard to score but couldn't. The third quarter started with a bang when Antonietta Bagnore scored a goal through the whole line of Alumnae. This placing the School girls in the lead. The defense of the Alumnae led by Capt. Frances Liberatore and Theresa Medonti held the School girls in check in the third quarter. Antonietta Naples and Grace Madonny were the strong defense players for the School girls. In the final quarter Josephine Maffie again scored a field goal in mid-air which tied the score. The game at that point was a defense game, but in the closing minutes of play Mary Ferro shot through a goal for the graduates to win the first Annual Hockey game 3-2.

Indians Defeat Wolves, 14-6

The Indians scalped the Wolves 14-6 in the Annual Sports Day event Thanksgiving morning on the school playground thus winning the St. Anthony's School Touch Football League Championship.

The Indians won the toss so they kicked off to the Wolves. In the opening play Popeye Sabanti carried the ball on a wide end and to gain about 5 yards before being tagged by Mucci Forte lost a twenty yard pass to Bacelli who dropped the ball. The Wolves kicked to the Indians 20 yard line where Forte of the Wolves did not hit the ball. Marino, captain of the Indians, kicked on the first down to place the ball on the 10 yard line.

The second quarter started with the Indians carrying the ball to the Wolves five yard line. Three forward passes were tried by Marino to Noterfanzo, but were downed by D'Alorio and Forte. On a running play the Indians fumbled and the Wolves recovered on the ten yard line to gain possession of the ball. In the opening play Forte lost a forward pass to Bacelli on the 30 yard stripe for a first down. The Wolves again tried a running play but fumbled the ball as Mucci recovered for the Indians. Marino on a wide end run gained a first down. On the next play a forward pass to Trocchio gained about five yards. With only a few minutes left to play for the half Joe Forte tried to run the ball to stall time but on the second run Forte was downed in the end zone by Canall for a safety, as the half ended.

The third quarter started with the Wolves kicking off to the Indians 20 yard line where Noterfanzo galloped 20 yds before being tagged by Lucio. An off-tackle play with Mucci carrying the ball gained 15 yards. Marino tossed a short pass to Canall which placed the ball on the Wolves 20. On the fourth down Marino shot a rifle pass to Mucci in the end zone to score the first touchdown.

The Indians kicked off to the Wolves and D'Alorio ran the ball 30 yards before being downed by Novone. A spiny play through the line by Canall gained five yards for the Wolves. The quarter ended with the Indians in the Lead 8-0.

In the final quarter the Indians started a long march down the field to the Wolves 30, where Marino shot a pass to Noterfanzo in the end zone to score the second touchdown for the Indians. The Indians kicked off to the Wolves 20 where Forte carried the ball to the 40 Forte rifled three short passes to place the ball on the 15 yard line. Another pass was tossed but was caught by Trocchio

C Y O In Elmira

Twenty years ago a chaplain, whose only title was Father, conceived the idea that a youth held in a County Jail in Illinois could become a good citizen if he were given half a chance and the proper kindly guidance. This chaplain, now the Most Rev. Bernard J. Sheil, senior auxiliary bishop of Chicago, is known as the "Apostle of Youth," a name he acquired after he founded the Catholic Youth Organization on the belief that even delinquent lads offered great loyalties if given any opportunity to prove their worth.

This CYO organization, whose emblem is recognized throughout Canada and Hawaii as well as in America, now has a membership of some 500,000 boys and girls in about 45 states. It is a growing institution of the awareness of Holy Mother Church of the participation of our youth in the program of leisure time activities so liberally provided by other churches and non-sectarian agencies.

Elmira is concerned today with adding a chapter to CYO history because Catholic priests and parsons realize the great need of supervision under Catholic leadership if we are to keep our youth close to the practices of their religion and faithful to their God. Only one year old this organization which depends entirely upon volunteer leaders has made an enviable record in the community. Hundreds of Elmira boys and girls will give you any evidence you need to convince you of the glorious success of Camp Villard-Mary, the first Catholic Camp in Chemung County and they too will voice their approval of the CYO program of year-around sports.

The Men's Committee headed by President Earl G. MacDonald is responsible for a touch football league which includes teams from seven parishes, will mark the closing of their season during the coming week. Guests of honor at a testimonial dinner sponsored by the mothers of the boys will be the members of the St. Cecilia's team champions of the season.

The basketball season with every parish entering a team in the three leagues which will feature this year's schedule will start practice sessions immediately. With emphasis on building men and promoting true sportsmanship many outstanding achievements of the CYO in the field of sports will be enthusiastically recognized by our local youth leaders.

The Recreation Committee of the Ladies of Charity have also contributed to this cause of youth and are concentrating on the primary function of the organization, "Every child in a Catholic supervised leisure time program."

Most popular of the activities sponsored by this Committee are the social dancing classes held each Friday night at Columbus Center, through the splendid cooperation of the local council of the Knights of Columbus. Over three hundred and fifty boys and girls attend these classes each week. The first hour and a half is devoted to students from the Junior High Schools and a two hour period is assigned to the Senior High School groups. Close but understanding supervision has made these functions well-attended by parents and youth alike. Attendance to date indicates an even more successful season than last year's.

Also planned by the Ladies Committee are crafts classes, dramatic courses and a basketball league.

With the approval of His Excellency the Most Rev. James E. Keane, Bishop of this Diocese and the cooperation of the parsons and assistant pastors of the local churches, this volunteer group of men and women are giving literally of their time and efforts for the cause of Catholic Youth. In times like these when we are slightly shaken out of our American security, far-sighted leaders realize the importance of protecting the boys and girls who will be our men and women of tomorrow from the sinister threat of pagan influences.

To the Church the home and the school is allotted much of the responsibility for this understanding guidance. Hand in hand with these Divine agents however must walk an organization which supplements their efforts and plans in particular of the leisure hours when the first steps toward delinquency and crime are most frequently taken. Such an agency is the Catholic Youth Organization, a living monument to a great man, an outstanding exponent of democracy, who is, to his enthusiastic co-workers as much of an inspiration as the work itself. He is the "Apostle of Youth" - who is still actively engaged in the program of the organization which he began so many years ago because of his belief in a lonely lad.
