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State K. of C. Protest Film

NEW YORK Joining in the protests against the showing of "Two-Faced Woman," classified as "C" condemned by the National Legion of Decency...

In a letter to Will Hayes, head of the Motion Picture Production Code, the State Council declared that all members in the state were being called upon to remain away from the picture as a protest.

The letter signed by John F. X. Browne, chairman of the Catholic Affairs Committee said in part:

"We respectfully submit that the interests of the motion picture industry would be better served if your office were more careful to insist on the revision of these films before they are released and thus eliminate the unfavorable and harmful publicity to both the particular producer and the industry as a whole which must necessarily follow when the Legion is compelled, as it has been here, to condemn the picture."

"As an illustration of what we mean by this latter statement we call to your attention that this committee finds it necessary to again call the special attention of the entire membership in this State to this film, requesting their cooperation in preventing its exhibition in communities in which they and their families and friends

reside. Obviously, such publicity will not serve to promote the feeling of friendliness and good will towards the industry which is the very foundation of public patronage of movie houses and, in turn, of the very life of the industry itself.

Good Shepherd Nuns 3rd Centenary To Be Marked At Holy Angels Home

The Sisters at Holy Angels Home are planning the observance of the third centenary of the beginning of the work of their Congregation. Their holy-founder, St. John Eudes, had been seeking a home for some

time. The religious congregation, which he set up to carry on the work was officially approved by a bull of Pope Alexander VIII, on the 2nd of Jan., 1666, and became known as the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of Refuge. The work of the Congregation spread to America, where the first house was opened at Buffalo, N. Y., in July, 1855. There are monasteries of the Congregation also at San Antonio, Dallas, Green Bay, El Paso, Little Rock, Pittsburgh, Erie and Wheeling.

The Sisters of this Congregation are sometimes referred to as the Sisters of the Good Shepherd. But this designation is not accurate, and was introduced to distinguish them from the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul. The Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of the Good Shepherd, is an offshoot of this Congregation, having been founded by St. Euphrasia Pelletier, a former superior in the Congregation of the Refuge.

Holy Angels also will celebrate its tenth anniversary of the formal opening of its work in Rochester with the admission of the first girl to the Institution, in February 1931. It is planned to issue a commemorative booklet for the occasion of this double anniversary.
