Diocesan N. C. W. C. Resolutions

Action taken in resolutions adopted at the Eleventh Annual Convention of the Rochester Diocesan Council, National Council of Catholic Women, held at Rochester, Nov. 21 is given below. Resolutions committee consisted of Mary A. Sullivan, Canandaigua, chairman; Kate L. Kane, Rochester; Mary C. O'Leary, Elmira and Helen McNamara, Canisius.

I - CATHOLIC SOCIETIES - Bearing in mind the need and importance of Catholic Societies and realizing the splendid work they have done in the past, we urge our Catholic women to affiliate with Catholic organizations, parochial or inter-parochial, and to participate actively in the work of the Catholic lay apostolate.

II - THE FAMILY - We protest against the invasion by the State of the rights of the individual or of the family.

We voice our unalterable opposition to proposed legislation legalizing the dissemination of information concerning so-called birth control.

III - FAMILY EDUCATION - We urge cooperation with the Family and Parent Education Committee of the N. C. W. C. in promoting the organizing study groups of young mothers with programs based on the form of life that Christ would have us live in the Christian home, emphasizing marriage as a Sacrament, children as gifts from God to be cherished and returned to Him perfected, and religion as a life that must be lived as well as preached by both parents.

In this end, we also recommend the establishment in every home of a family shrine as a center for common prayers and a reminder of the abiding presence of the spirit of Divine Love.

IV - FURTHER CATHOLIC EDUCATION - Recognizing the crying need for religious and moral training we have, at great expense and sacrifice, maintained our Catholic schools. We realize that many of our children are unable to take advantage of these.

We, therefore, advocate the support of religious vacation schools, especially in rural districts and the formation of Study Clubs for the religious education of Catholic pupils in public high schools.

We, the women of the Rochester Diocesan Council of the National Council of Catholic Women offer our assistance toward the development of the Catechetical program of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

V - YOUTH - We urge the support of girls' clubs under Catholic leadership, and the organization and development of youth groups with spiritual, cultural, vocational and recreational activities that will bind them closer to the Church and help them to serve "God and Country."

VI - CATHOLIC EVIDENCE - We urge the support and patronage of the Catholic Evidence Libraries established at the Columbus Civic Centre in Rochester and in Elmira, N. Y.

We further endorse the work of our dealers in establishing Catholic book shelves, and donating Catholic books and periodicals to our public libraries.

VII - NATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOR DECENT LITERATURE - We pledge our cooperation in the Diocesan Campaign supporting the National Organization for Decent Literature.

VIII - LEGION OF DECENCY - We acknowledge the good that has been achieved by the Legion of Decency.

We pledge anew our cooperation and we urge our members not only to join the Legion, but also to promote it under diocesan guidance, to the utmost of their zeal and ability.

IX - NATIONAL CATHOLIC SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SERVICE - The rapidly growing need for Catholic social workers throughout our country demands increased and continuous effort for the effective maintenance and development of this School.

It is a major achievement of the National Council of Catholic Women, committed to our care over twenty years ago by the Bishops of our country.

We earnestly urge its continued support by all our affiliated organizations.

X - SOCIAL JUSTICE - We rededicate ourselves to zealous efforts to know and make known the saving principles of social justice that are outlined in the Encyclicals.

XIII - PRESS - Since we can have a strong Catholic Press only if the laity gives to it constant and effective support, we call upon our members to lend their strong assistance to our Catholic editors in promoting circulation and a proper share of advertising in our press.

XIV - RADIO - We endorse the radio programs sponsored by the N. C. C. M. and the N. C. C. W. and by our diocese and urge our affiliated units to give them wholehearted support.

XV - RETREATS - Realizing that the closed retreat is a most important factor in the development of that personal sanctification which is essential to real Catholic Action, we pledge ourselves to cooperate in a wider extension of this movement.

XVI - INSTITUTE ON INDUSTRY - The National Council of Catholic Women, wishing to share the responsibility of helping to educate leaders in the industrial field leaders who are imbued with the Christian spirit and who recognize that economic peace must be inspired by Christian principles has conducted for five years an Institute on Industry, which is in reality a summer school for women workers.

We encourage the attendance of workers from our diocese and call attention of others to the Institute.

XVII - TO MAKE CHRISTMAS CHRISTIAN - Our Christmas should be commemorative of Christ and the Crab.

We urge all Catholic men and women to buy and exchange only Christmas cards which have a truly religious Christmas greeting.

XVIII - FURTHER RESOLUTIONS - We take this opportunity to express our gratitude to His Excellency Most Rev. James E. Kearney, for his inspiring talk at our Convention luncheon meeting, and for his continued interest in the work of the Council.

We pledge him the loyalty of the Rochester Diocesan Council, N. C. C. W., and promise him our full cooperation in all that he may undertake.

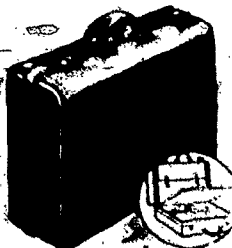
