Catholic Guidance Given In Current Events By Verein

Catholic Young Men and National Defense

ST. LOUIS, December 3.—Vehement denunciation of the action of the United States military authorities in making certain prophylactics available to the men in the service, is expressed by the Catholic Central Verein of America in a resolution adopted by the 8th annual convention held in New York. The practice, the resolution affirms, encourages sexual immorality, at least implicitly.

The statement, which urged support of the USO and wide distribution of the free pamphlet, "Guide Right," asserts:

The defense program adopted by our country has brought together large numbers of American young men in the various branches of military service. Many excellent qualities of the men have been revealed by the situation, especially has evidenced their fidelity to their obligations to country. However, a regards the civil aspect of their new environment they are exposed to physical and moral dangers which may have great social consequences in the future.

The Catholic Central Verein of America, appreciating the difficulties confronting the young men removed from home influences and surroundings urges that everything possible be done to further their general well-being.

LAUDS USO

We are grateful for the formation of the United Service Organizations and request our affiliated societies to co-operate wholeheartedly with it and with the National Catholic Community Service, the special agency designated by the American Hierarchy to assist the men in the service.

We recommend to the nation as a whole and particularly to the members of our societies, that prayers be said for the armed forces. We suggest that the two free pamphlets, published by the Central Bureau, "Guide Right" and "The Name of God," written especially for the men called to the colors be widely circulated. The sane and proven advice contained in "Guide Right" will not only serve to safeguard their spiritual welfare, but will also help enable them to return home free from the moral and physical stain which makes the foundation of a healthy family impossible.

Without qualification do we condemn the action of the military authorities of the United States in making certain prophylactics available to the men in the armed forces thereby encouraging, at least implicitly, sexual immorality. It is to be deplored that the only concern is the prevention of the spread of disease; defense of the moral law in this regard is left out of consideration.

CHAPLAIN'S ROLE

The role of the military chaplain should be fully appreciated both by the men in service and their friends and relatives at home. Catholic service men are asked to make themselves known at once to their assigned chaplains. It is suggested that the names of Catholics in the various branches of the country's forces be forwarded to the chaplains, preferably by their pastors. For it is quite difficult to discover the Catholics in the military centers without such co-operation, and spiritual work is hindered if not rendered impossible.

Although the chaplain takes the place of the pastor at home, the men in the service none the less stand in need of sustained social contact with their families and friends. Toward this end we recommend that frequent correspondence be maintained, especially by those at home.

Finally, Catholic young men in the service must set a good example, wherever they may be. Plunged into the maelstrom of national defense, they are making great sacrifices; many have left positions of trust and honor to assume humble places in the service of their country. We appreciate what they are doing, and are grateful to them for their sacrifices for their faithfulness to duty. It is our earnest hope and prayer that even though they be placed in the most unfaithful to God and their loved ones, we may look forward to their returning home soon, unscathed, to resume normal civic life, to help build the America of the future on foundations that will include the faithful of Our Fathers and the moral teachings of the Catholic Church.

DEATH THREATS FAIL TO SWAY CONVERT PRIEST

The priest of the Catholic Mission of Korea, in Southern Albania, is Father Tribiki. He was formerly a Schismatic priest and was received into the Church some years ago.

When the city of Korea was occupied by the Greeks in November of 1940, Father Tribiki was persecuted by the Greek Schismatics, because he had become a Catholic. His house and chapel were robbed. He was told to leave under threat of death.

But he refused to desert his people. For months, he was not able to offer Holy Mass. For twenty weeks his whereabouts was not generally known. It was thought he had died or had been killed.

The Holy See has notified us that Father Tribiki is still alive. He rejected frequent demands to renounce the Catholic Church and return to the Greek Orthodox. As a result he suffered much torment and loss of health. Nevertheless he remained at his mission post. Now he and his war-stricken people are in great need.

Father Tribiki has to re-erect his little mission chapel and at the same time help his destitute people. Three Hundred Dollars is needed to meet the emergency.

Surely, this heroic, self-sacrificing convert priest deserves our sympathy and our help. His devotion to God and to souls should inspire every reader to send something to help Father Tribiki.
