When The "Mill Wheel" Spins So Does Mr. Blatter

When gentle splashing merges into the "Musical Mill Wheel" theme song, the work of NBC Sound Effects Man Frank Blatter has begun in earnest.

For this tuneful, fast moving informal program, heard each week Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday over Station WHAM, Blatter usually has few sound effects, but occasionally the "Mill Wheel" program takes odd paths under the guidance of Walter Patterson, its singing master of ceremonies.

The Patterson song style is the crooning type, and his conversational tone is directed into the very heart of the home kitchen. Nevertheless, these props and gadgets were necessary recently to set a scene:

- 1. A 15-inch waterwheel in one foot of water.
- 2. A wind whistle.
- 3. A song whistle.
- 4. A large wash tub with 17 pots and pans inside for crash effects.
- 5. A cuckoo clock.
- 6. A .38 calibre revolver for shot sound.
- 7. A dozen glasses for breaking.
- 8. Six tin cups for horse hoofs sounds. Blatter himself gives whinny neigh and horses blow.

All these accoutrements were used in effecting Patterson's riding into a "kitchen" to sing a Western song, "which he does very well," says the imperturbable Mr. Blatter himself a musician.
