

Old Paper Collection Through School Hits 32,248 Pound Mark

Spurred on by the collection of over 32,248 pounds of waste paper and magazines by only eight of the twenty-two schools participating in the Parochial School Newspaper Drive the remaining schools are working assiduously to collect all the old newspapers, magazines and cardboard possible for the remaining two collections on Saturday December 13 and 20.

Turning in the greatest amount of paper last Saturday was St. Boniface School with 11,262 pounds. The other schools reporting were: Holy Rosary, 10,574; Holy Cross, 7,700; St. George, 2,382; St. Lucy, 1,234; St. Theresa, 1,116; and Mount Carmel, 620. Prizes offered in the drive will be awarded, not on the greatest amount of paper turned in per school, but rather on the largest amount collected per student.

The Chamber of Commerce Committee on the Preservation of Waste Paper advises that, now, since the outbreak of war, waste paper is more urgently needed than ever before because of the tremendous speed-up in defense production. The children are not only cooperating in National Defense but also contributing to the fulfilment of the Blessed Martin de Porres House, recently opened Settlement for local negroes.

Saturday, Dec. 13 collections will be taken at Blessed Sacrament, Holy Apostles, Holy Redeemer, St. Andrew, St. Mary, St. Michael SS, Peter and Paul and St. Charles Schools. Residents of the neighborhoods of these schools are very urgently requested to cooperate with the school in supplying old newspapers and magazines. They are advised to either send their paper to the school in the neighborhood on Saturday morning, Dec. 13 or if that is impossible to call the local office of The Society for the Propagation of the Faith, St. Louis 403 and arrangements will be made to pick it up.

Hold Catechism Exhibition

MONTREAL In connection with the religious observance of the 50th anniversary of Montreal, an exhibition was held at Mount St. Louis College, directed by the Christian Brothers, showing what has been done in the past three centuries in teaching the catechism.
