

St. Bonaventure's College Activities

ST. BONAVENTURE The Rt. Rev. M. G. David F. Hickey V. O. P. A. Pastor of St. Bernard's Church Bradford, Pa., pontificated at the Solemnities for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception in the sanctuary chapel in Doveraux Hall at St. Bonaventure Monday.

An alumnus of St. Bonaventure College and Seminary, Msgr. Hickey has the distinction of being among the first to be endowed with the title of Præbendary Apostolic in the reign of Pius XII. This rank has been conferred in virtue of fifty years of valued service in the Erie Diocese and follows upon his previous honors of being vicar general for the past three years.

Msgr. Hickey officiated with all the ceremonial attending his rank and honored the Seminary by making his first function since the bestowal of the same on the fiftyth anniversary of his ordination last July. It was necessary to obtain permission from the Rt. Rev. John A. Duffy, Bishop of Buffalo, for Msgr. Hickey to pontificate outside his home diocese.

Assisting him in the solemn high Mass in honor of the Immaculate Conception were members of the Seminary faculty. The Rev. Eustace Smith, O.F.M., vice-rector and John Lambert Rowan, O.F.M., a deacon and subdeacon respectively. The Rev. Fidelis O'Rourke was archpriest while the Rev. Callistus Smith O.F.M. was master of ceremonies. The sermon for the occasion was delivered by the Rev. Conrad O'Leary, O.F.M.

A dinner was tendered at noon in honor of the Monsignor in the company of the seminarians. Addresses were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Salvatore Mitchell on behalf of the student body and members of the Erie Diocese studying here. The Very Rev. Thomas Ptasman, O.F.M. rector of the seminary, congratulated the jubilation and the Monsignor graciously evoked memories of a long past from the days of 1931 when he left this seminary as a young priest.

University of Buffalo St. Francis, St. Vincent and Niagara and Canisius.

Defense Book Campaign To Supply Reading Matter For Boys In Camps

NEW YORK (AP) Millions of books will be provided for men in the armed forces of the United States and the Merchant Marines through a National Defense Book Campaign sponsored by the American Library Association, the American Red Cross, and the United Service Organizations including the National Catholic Community Service.

The books will be collected in libraries throughout the country for distribution to army camps, naval bases, USO clubs and other service centers. From five to ten million volumes are expected to be provided through the campaign designed to supplement the library services provided by the Government.

Under the program outlined for the campaign, civilians throughout the country will be asked to contribute books, delivering them to the nearest public, school or institutional library or to volunteers from cooperating local groups who will collect them and turn them in to the libraries. In communities where no libraries are situated, schools or other places will be designated as collection centers. All books obtained will be classified and listed and reports will be sent to headquarters of the National Defense Book Campaign in New York City where a distribution control system will be operated.

DR. CARTWRIGHT OBSERVES 25TH YEAR AS PRIEST

WASHINGTON The Rev. Dr. John Keating Cartwright, widely-known educator and speaker, observed the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination in the Church of the Immaculate Conception, of which he is pastor.

Dr. Cartwright was professor of church history at the Sulcivan Seminary from 1920 to 1927, professor of modern history at St. Paul's College from 1932 to 1934, and since 1938 has been assistant professor of pastoral theology at the Catholic University of America. He is Director of the Washington Catholic Radio Hour.

8TH BIRTHDAY Chicago, The Rev. Francis M. Mostolowicz, pastor of Immaculate Conception (Polish) Church, is preparing to celebrate his eighth birthday anniversary. He was the first pastor of St. Mary of Costyn, Church at Downers Grove, which this month celebrated its golden jubilee.
