K. of C. Offers Club For Defense Use

Use of their clubhouse and facilities for national defense purposes has been offered to authorities here by Elmitra Council Knights of Columbus.

Following is a letter sent to City Manager Ralph D. Klebes, Chairman, Elmitra and Chemung County Civilian Defense Council:

"My dear Mr. Klebes: Elmitra Council, Knights of Columbus, adopted the following resolution unanimously at a regular meeting Monday, Dec. 15:

"Resolved, that the rooms and facilities of Columbus Centre be made available to the Elmitra and Chemung County Civilian Defense Council for any meeting they may desire to hold there and to it further:
