War Aid Planned By Central Verein Here

The Catholic Central Verein of America Rochester Branch at its meeting last Sunday devoted most of its time to matters connected with the war. Excerpts from letters received by the Central Bureau at St. Louis from various chaplains in the U. S. Army were read. These strongly commended the Central Bureau for the splendid work it is doing in the distribution of the pamphlet entitled "Guide Right".

Several of the chaplains stated that nothing that comes to the troops is more useful than this pamphlet. The chaplains have requested shipments in large numbers of the pamphlet so that they may be able to place a copy in the hands of each man in the armed forces of the country.

The delegates and members of the Branch were urged to contribute towards the expense of issuing the pamphlets, and to do all in their power to have others help the Central Bureau to meet the demands of the chaplains to place a copy of "Guide Right" in the hands of each man in the armed forces of the country.

Adoption Resolution

The Branch adopted a resolution expressing wholehearted cooperation with the government and calling upon its members to assist at daily mass. The resolution follows:

Resolved that the Catholic Central Verein of America, Rochester Branch, cooperate wholeheartedly with our government in the prosecution of the wars in which we are now involved, and

Resolved further that inasmuch as the present World War has been brought about by mankind outraging Divine Justice and its termination can be secured fully by the satisfaction of Divine Justice, effective means must be taken to satisfy Divine Justice, and

Resolved further that inasmuch as the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is the most effective means of satisfying Divine Justice, we urge our members to assist as often as possible at daily Mass for the intention of bringing about an end of hostilities and of securing a just and lasting peace.

The recent pronouncement of the Hierarchy of the United States on "The Crisis of Christianity" was discussed. In view however, of the shortness of time it was decided to postpone more complete discussion until a later meeting.

Arrangements were made to attend the annual Mass offered for the repose of the soul of Rev. Jacob F. Staub, who for some many years was connected with the Rochester Branch and guided it in its course. The Mass will be celebrated at Holy Redeemer Church, of which he was pastor on Jan. 18, at 11 A. M.

A special meeting will be held in St. Joseph's Hall on Jan. 9 at 8:30 P. M. This will be a joint meeting of the men and women. The subject for discussion will be the resolution adopted by the National organization in New York City last August and entitled "After War Problems." The preliminary discussion of this resolution will be followed by questions and discussions from the floor. The public is invited to attend the meeting.

Rev. Stephen Aulbach, C.S.S.R., Spiritual Advisor of the Branch, congratulated the Central Verein on the publication of the pamphlet "Guide Right." He emphasized the importance of prevention in the matters referred to in the pamphlet, and stated that the contents of this publication should greatly help in the way of prevention. President William J. Fuehrer presided.
