CARDINAL ORDERS STRICT CHURCH MUSIC REGULATION

QUEBEC Recommendations of the Archdiocesan Sacred Music which prohibit the use in churches of the Archdiocese of a number of well known musical compositions, including the Wedding March from Mendelssohn's "Midsummer Night's Dream" have been brought to the attention of the diocesan clergy by His Eminence Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve, Archbishop of Quebec, with the order that they must be followed.

He recalls that he has on several other occasions expressed the laws of the Church with regard to liturgical music but that abuses have been too frequent.

Reminding the clergy that they are masters of the liturgy in their churches, His Eminence warns that the laity who often arrange the programs of sacred music must be advised of the liturgical rules.

Non-Catholic Study

Brooklyn The Brooklyn Diocese's program of instructions for non-Catholics has begun for the fifth year at 50 centers throughout the diocese. About 1,500 persons are expected to attend the series of lectures this year.

SECOND DESTROYER NAMED FOR CATHOLIC NAVAL HERO

BOSTON (NC) The second destroyer to bear the name of John J. Doran a Catholic enlisted man of the United States Navy and hero of the Spanish War has shipped down the ways at the Boston Navy Yard. It was christened by Mrs. Mary E. Hurley, M. Doran's sister.

Mr. Doran carried out his part on a cable-cutting mission under point blank enemy fire although his ship was shattered by the first enemy volley. He received the Congressional Medal of Honor and was named as "the hero of heroes" of the cable-cutting. The first destroyer to bear his name was one of 50 traded to Britain for Western Hemisphere bases.

A CHILD IS ENTITLED TO RESPECT

There are some grown-up persons both parents and teachers who seem to take it for granted that a child should be ready at any time to let others know exactly what he thinks and how he feels and to reveal any and all of his faults and weaknesses. When one comes to think about it, demand this of a child is surely taking an unfair advantage of him since he is by no means the older person's equal in worldly wisdom.

A noted psychologist advises persons who are in charge of children, not to feel free to prod the child to reveal what he thinks, or whether he likes his father or his mother better or to drag his shortcomings into the open. He declares that one of the ways in which parents and teachers can exert a "tremendous" influence in guiding children is to help the boy or girl make his own adjustments, but that to do this does not mean that the child should be required to make a display or an exhibit as it were of all he thinks or all that he has done.

Even the law of the land recognizes the right of the individual not to make statements which can be used against him. Sometimes, to be sure, it is desirable that a child

shall tell quite fully what he has seen or done in order that those in authority may understand and govern their own actions accordingly. But in any case we must not take from the child that very precious individual possession his own self-respect.

As a usual thing the confidence of the child may be gained and held easily by the one whom he respects and who respects him. Sometimes the child will not be ready to reveal what he has in his heart and mind at once. We are a good deal like that ourselves—desires of keeping our impressions to ourselves until we are in a revealing mood.

Many a child, has told untruths as a method of defense against a sudden demand for information. Dr. John J. B. Morgan, Professor of Psychology at Northwestern University, declares that a study of at least 2,500 children in the university's psychological clinic, convinces him that many mental ailments of adults could have been avoided by proper early guidance in the home and school.

The responsibility of parents and teachers is indeed great. As far as possible, we should encourage children to be frank but should seldom

force a confession. We should teach them to be hopeful, to expect justice and a square deal. It is better to err occasionally in giving the child the benefit of the doubt than to give him the feeling that he has not been fairly dealt with. When a normal child knows that we trust him, he will try to measure up to what we expect, and eventually that which is true and noble within him will grow and bear the finest kind of fruit.
