

Spiritual Bouquet Sent Pope By Sodalists

ST. LOUIS (N. C.)—A spiritual bouquet of \$39,011 Masses and 738,408 receptions of Holy Communion for his Intentions, was cabled to Pope Pius XII, December 24, as a Christmas gift from the Sodalists and youth of North America.

A triduum of Masses and Holy Communions for the Pope's Intentions was made in connection with the observance of the 1st of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, patronal feast of the United States. Figures from all parts of the United States and various parts of Canada were tabulated at The Queen's Work here, American sodality secretariate. The Rev. J. Roger Lyons, S. J., an associate national Sodality director, who supervised the work, signed the cablegram.

LOME, Togoland, West Africa.—The Governor of this colony and His Excellency the Most Rev. Giovanni Maria Cassou, Vicar Apostolic of Lome, were present at the inauguration of a nursery for children of lepers conducted by the Sisters of Our Lady of the Apostles in the village of Ataka.

The nursery was established after the Mother General of the community was permitted to visit the mission of the lepers at Togo.

supply of vital materials and metals needed.

The listing gives official assurance of the national government's concern that the work be completed to form an essential link in the nation's emergency, hospital spokesmen stated, this week.

Honorary Chairmen Named
With Bishop Kearney serving as Honorary Chairmen are Harper Sibley, president of the United Service Organizations, and Sol Heumann, prominent industrialist. Louis A. Langie will serve as vice-chairman.

Founded in 1857 and the oldest hospital in Rochester, St. Mary's has from its earliest days served patients "of all denominations or of none"; campaign leaders state All faiths will be asked to join in supporting the building project, they announce.

The need for a new hospital to replace the building now in use has long been recognized, Vice-Chairman Langie points out. Part of the present building dates back to 1858, the sturdy stone walls having resisted, in large part, the disastrous fire of February, 1891, when the interior of the hospital was destroyed.

Funds for its reconstruction at that time were raised by popular subscription. Since that time no public appeal has been made by the hospital, except in 1923, when funds for a nurses' home were solicited.

St. Mary's Hospital was founded here by the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, and their order has administered the hospital since that time. During the Civil War the United States Government sent thousands of sick and wounded Union soldiers here to be cared for at the hospital, a point recalled, this week, when the action of OPM, assigning an A-4 preference rating, was announced.

Funds for Completing Job
Difficulties in obtaining material unless construction were begun without delay, was foreseen by hospital authorities early in 1941. A building fund, fortunately created over a long period of years from comparatively small gifts and bequests, was available so that the building could be started while material was still obtainable. The building fund campaign will supply funds to complete and furnish the structure and enable it to take an essential part in the defense setup of city and nation.
