### Expresses U. S. Loyalty Of American-Born Japanese

SEATTLE—(NC)—United devotion to the United States of America by American-born Japanese in this section was expressed by Jimmy Sakamoto, Editor of the Japanese-American Courier, in an address at a St. Vincent de Paul Society meeting at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs (Japanese) Church here.

"We are united in devotion to America and in opposition to an alien enemy that has attacked the United States," he said. "The way our enemy attacked us has united us."

A convert to the Church and a native-born American citizen, Mr. Sakamoto is one of the outstanding Pacific Coast leaders of the Japanese-American Citizens' League, which numbers some 15,000 members throughout the country.

The Rev. Leo Tibesar, M. M., pastor of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church, told the St. Vincent de Paul members that their meeting at the Japanese parish church at this time was particularly appreciated.

"Our Japanese people here are much distressed because of Japan's attack on the United States," Father Tibesar said. "There is no question of the loyalty of the American-born Japanese. Some 3,000 members of the Japanese-American Citizens' League are serving in the United States army."

"We know that the vast majority of the foreign-born, or first generation, Japanese, who have resided in our midst for so many years, also are loyal to America. If, technically, they are classed as enemy aliens, it is not their fault. They chose to come here many years ago, and if they are not citizens it is because our laws prevented their naturalization."

Father Tibesar has taken a leading part, working with the United

States Government officials, in solving difficulties and unnecessary distress among the Japanese here and in aiding the Japanese-American association in setting up committees which are now cooperating with the F. B. I., Civilian Defense, and Red Cross, Federal Reserve and other governmental agencies.
