Mayor Praises Work of Nuns In N. Y. Hospital

NEW YORK (NC) — Impressive tribute to the self-sacrificing labors of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul who conduct St. Vincent's Hospital, here, was paid by Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia on Sunday, when the Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, Archbishop of New York, dedicated a new nine-story addition to the hospital.

The addition to St. Vincent's Hospital is called the Archbishop Spellman Pavilion, and Mayor LaGuardia said its availability at this time is a great boon to the metropolis. "The need of hospitals in New York City is very great," the Mayor said, "and this addition comes in a most propitious time, for every additional bed at this time is greatly needed."

The speaker said that, as Mayor of the City of New York, he called upon the people "to contribute generously and to take an active part in the drive" to raise \$750,000 for the St. Vincent's Hospital Building Fund. The new addition is the major part of a \$1,000,000 modernization program which will equip the hospital for any war-time emergency.

"The money which the people will contribute will be most usefully invested," Mayor LaGuardia assured the people of New York. "We ask for contributions to pay for the bricks, to pay for the construction, to pay for the equipment, and the instruments, and the furniture. That, all of that, money can buy, but the one part of this institution, that which is older than science, is that loving human touch which only the good Sisters can provide; that service which demands a 24-hour day, that service which demands time and a half only for prayer."

"Yes, money will pay for this new addition, that will be the contribution of the people of the City of New York, but the services, the kind, helpful, understanding aid is God's constant reminder of His mercy."

Right Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen in his new series of addresses over the Catholic Hour Program, Sunday 8:00 to 8:30 P. M., E.S.T., calls to his listeners to pursue the task of salvation leading to peace in our day. "Peace" will be his general subject—peace through a Saviour—and, as in the past two years, his underlying theme will be a call to prayer and to penance, an appeal to all Americans to return to God.

The subject of Peace Through a Saviour will be developed in his addresses every Sunday through Feb. 15-1, e. until the first Sunday of Lent. Peace is the tranquility of order: It is inseparable from justice.

From the first Sunday of Lent until Easter the burden of the broadcasts will be the great question: Why does God permit this war?

In his first broadcast, Monsignor Sheen asked individual men and women, Catholic, Jew and Protestant, to pledge themselves for the duration of the war to spend an hour daily in prayer.
