From the first Sunday of Lent until Easter the burden of the broadcasts will be the great ques-tion: Why does God permit this war?


In his first broadcast, Monsignor Sheen asked individual men and women. Catholic. Jew and Protestant, to pledge themselves for the duration of the war to spend an
