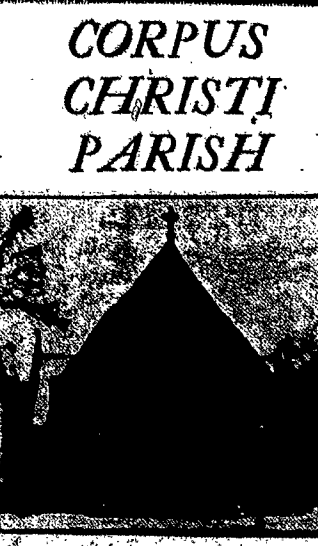

**PRIESTS—REWRITE** Heading . . . LONDON. — Priests acting as fire-watchers will be at liberty to attend to casualties and to go on specific sick-calls both in and out of air-raid periods, it is announced here by His Eminence Arthur Cardinal Hinsley, following negotiations with the Ministry of Home Security.

It is intended, said the Cardinal's statement, that the fire-guard duties undertaken by the clergy shall take place at their presbytery and church premises.

When, several weeks ago, all men except doctors and those in the defense service, were ordered to report for fire-watching duties, the Catholic Press here pointed out that under the then existing arrangements priests would be liable to prosecution if they left their posts to give spiritual ministrations to injured persons in need of it.
