### NO PLACE FOR TOTAL WAR

Within the linits of a new order founded on moral principles, once the more dangerous sources of armed comflicts have been elimimiled, there is no place for a total warfare or for a mad rush to arm-aments. The calamity of a world war, with the economic and social war, with the economic and social ruin and the moral dissolution and breakdown which follow in its trail, should not be permitted to envelop the human race for a third time.

In order that mankind be preserved from such a misfortune it is essential to proceed with sincerity and honeily to a progressive limitation of armamenis. The lack of equilibrium between the exaggerated armaments of the powerful States and the limited powerful States and the limited armaments of the weaker ones is a menace to harmony and peace among nations and demands that an ample and proportionate limit be placed upon production and pos-mession of offensive weapons in proportion to the degree in which disarmament is affected.

Means must be found which will be appropriate, honorable and effi-cacious in order that the norm "pacts must be observed" will once again enjoy its vital and moral function in the juridical relations between States.
